**NOTE:**

The fact that a building is not shown as being Listed; of Local Historical Interest; of Townscape Merit or of Local Historical Interest does not mean that it does not have merit and does not contribute to the character of the Conservation Area. As the character of Conservation Areas are often greater than the sum of their parts nearly all buildings are important. In any event, and this is critical, the designation of the Conservation area means that buildings whether Listed, otherwise designated or not will be need consent for demolition (other than those below a certain size). Applications for consent for demolition will be considered in the light of national policies set out in PPS5.
