FOCUS OF UPCOMING MEETING

• **July 7, 2020:** A bi-annual meeting of the CIAC members to discuss ongoing activities and identify new areas of focus to ensure full and equitable engagement of people & communities.

COLLABORATIVE ONGOING NAM PROJECTS: CIAC AND CIAC-RELATED

Collaborative projects are intended to: 1) identify issues of common interest and marshal needed leadership; 2) develop tools and networks needed for progress; and 3) develop joint leadership possibilities through individually-authored Perspective papers. Ongoing activities include:

- Community Health Needs Assessments Principles & Practices: An NAM Working Group is developing a Special Publication to describe the emerging principles of the community health improvement process; how these principles can be used to further the goals of health equity; and opportunities for transformative assessment and improvement in population health that include perspectives from all stakeholders, including health systems, public health departments, and the community.
- Technologies to Enhance Person, Family, & Community Activation: An NAM Working Group comprising leadership from key stakeholder sectors to identify, prioritize, and advise on key issues related to the potential of technologies to make care more patient-centered, equitable, accessible and convenient for patients, while enhancing the quality of medical decisions. The Working Group is in the process of writing two NAM discussion papers on related sub-topics. January 17, 2019 meeting summary.
- Assessing Meaningful Community Engagement in Health & Health Care: With support from the Robert Wood
 Johnson Foundation, this collaborative project seeks to review existing measures for evaluating community
 engagement in health care program and policy decision-making at the system, local, state, and nation levels
 and to establish a process for identifying an indicator or set of indicators that can be used to measure
 community engagement in a wide range of settings.

CIAC-RELATED COLLABORATIVE PROJECTS UNDER CONSIDERATION
