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RETURNING HUSKERS HUNGRY FOR MORE SUCCESS



Senior Hamish Murray leads Nebraska into the 2024-25 season after producing a team-best 72.69 stroke average over 29 rounds as a junior in 2023-24.

The Nebraska men's golf team hopes to continue building momentum and climbing the ladder in the Big Ten and national standings in Head Coach Judd Cornell's third season leading the program in 2024-25.

An experienced group of returning golfers will be challenged by a talented collection of newcomers in pushing for better scores and stronger performances throughout the season.

Last season, Nebraska closed the year with a school-record 290.66 stroke average while producing its best Big Ten Conference Tournament finish since 2019.

The Huskers will lose the leadership of seniors Harry Crockett, Gentry Scheve and Will Marshall from the 2023-24 team, but the cupboard is far from bare for the Big Red.

Nebraska's top returning golfer will be Hamish Murray. The senior from Sydney, Australia led the Huskers with a 72.69 stroke average. Murray, who spent his first two seasons at NCAA Division II Cameron University in Oklahoma, was a consistent and reliable contributor at the top of Nebraska's lineup in 2023-24. He produced five top-20 individual finishes on the year, including a season-best tie for ninth in his Husker debut at the Bearcat Invitational in Cincinnati (Sept. 18-19).

Reed Malleck will be expected to add more stability to Nebraska's lineup. The fifth-year Husker from York, Neb., earned five lineup appearances on the year. He finished the season with a 74.29 stroke average over 17 rounds, before earning his bachelor's degree as a finance major in May of 2024. During the summer, Malleck took his game to a higher level by winning the Nebraska Amateur Championship.

An outstanding performer on and off the course, Malleck will be expected to provide leadership to the young Huskers on the roster.

Quinn Yost and Davis Johnson will provide the Big Red with more talent and experience

entering the 2024-25 season. Yost, a junior from Albuquerque, N.M., ranked fourth among the Huskers with a 73.38 stroke average over 21 rounds a year ago. He tied for second at the Stampede at the Creek, after producing back-to-back top-20 finishes at the Badger Invitational and Purdue Fall Invitational.

Johnson, a junior from Chaska, Minn., finished his sophomore season strong, including a lineup appearance for the Huskers at the Big Ten Championship. He won the individual title at the Stampede at the Creek with a three-round total of 215 (-1), before competing in the Husker lineup at the Hawkeye Invitational to close the regular season. Johnson finished with a 74.73 stroke average over 15 rounds for the Big Red in 2023-24.

Senior Grant Jabenis from Omaha will add more experience for the Huskers, along with redshirt sophomore Evan McDermott. Jabenis and McDermott give Nebraska six returning letterwinners in 2024-25.

Rudy Sautron hopes to make an instant impact for the Huskers. The sophomore from France follows Hamish Murray as a former golfer from Cameron University. Sautron was a member of the NCAA Division II GCAA All-Freshman Team and a PING All-South Central Region performer in his lone season at Cameron. He was also the Lone Star Conference Freshman of the Year. He produced a 71.78 stroke average over 32 rounds in 2023-24.

Jackson Bengé, a newcomer out of Nebraska high school power Omaha Westside, is one of three true freshmen to join the Huskers. Bengé helped the Warriors to back-to-back Class A state team titles in 2023 and 2024. The 2022 Nebraska Junior Match Play champion, Bengé was also the Class A-1 District champion in both 2022 and 2023 before earning a pair of Class A all-state honors.

Bengé is joined in Nebraska's class of newcomers by 2023 Kansas Class 6A Player-of-the-Year James Ackerman. The freshman from

Leawood, Kan., led Blue Valley High School to back-to-back Class 6A team titles in 2021 and 2022.

The Husker newcomers add more international flavor with freshman Brodie Cunningham. The 2023 Barrie Douglas Scottish Junior Masters Champion produced seven top-10 individual finishes in 16 European tournaments from April to October of 2023. He was just 16 years old when he signed with the Huskers in November of 2023.

Redshirt freshman Rhett Hughes will also get his first chance to make an impact on the course for the Huskers this season. Hughes was the runner-up at the Oklahoma Junior Amateur and took 10th at the Oklahoma Class 6A-1 State Championship in 2023.

The Huskers open the 2024-25 campaign at the Gopher Invitational (Sept. 8-9), before playing host to the Git-R-Done Invitational at Firethorn Golf Club in Lincoln (Sept. 23-24). It will be Nebraska's first home tournament since April 16-17, 2021.

The Big Red return to the Badger Invitational in Wisconsin (Sept. 29-Oct. 1), before heading to the Qubein Cup in Greensboro, N.C. (Oct. 14-15). Nebraska wraps up the fall portion of its tournament schedule with the Steelwood Invitational in Loxley, Ala. (Oct. 26-27).

The Huskers will open the spring season at the Palmas Del Mar Collegiate in Humacao, Puerto Rico (Feb. 9-11), before spending more than a month preparing their games for The Johnnie-O in St. Simons Island, Ga. (March 17-18).

The Big Red head to Arizona for the Bell Bank "Pay It Forward" Collegiate in Phoenix (March 24-25), before traveling to Missouri for the Tiger Intercollegiate (April 7-8).

Nebraska closes the regular season at the Robert Kepler Intercollegiate in Columbus, Ohio (April 18-19), before traveling to Baltimore for the Big Ten Championship (April 25-27).



Reed Malleck returns for his fifth season as a Husker in 2024-25 after winning the 2024 Nebraska Amateur Championship. Malleck has competed in 57 rounds for the Huskers during his career, including 17 rounds with a career-best 74.29 stroke average a year ago.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten Conference is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders. Even in its infancy, the conference established itself as the preeminent collection of institutions in the nation, where the pursuit of academic excellence prevailed as the definitive goal.

The history of the Big Ten traces back more than 125 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago where, on Jan. 11, 1895, Purdue President James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Northwestern and Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bona fide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On Feb. 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the fundamentals of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905.

Indiana and the State University of Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State joined the conference, bringing the membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, a name that was eventually incorporated in 1987.

As the 1900s dawned, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were conducted at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women. Big Ten schools compete in a total of 42 different sports, furthering the conference's commitment to broad-based programming and providing more participation opportunities than any conference in the country.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations. But Michigan's appearance in 1902 cultivated a relationship that has endured for more than a century.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915, the first award to demonstrate support for the educational emphasis placed on intercollegiate athletics. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to one male and one female student of the graduating class who have attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a Big Ten student-athlete can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of seven men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971, Jim Delany in 1989, Kevin Warren in 2020, and current commissioner Tony Petitti in 2023.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produce over \$10 billion in funded research, doubling any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of the pioneering technology, where it approved country-wide testing in 2005. In 2006, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

In 2006, Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with FOX Networks to create the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 2,200 live events across all platforms each year. The 24/7 network is the ultimate destination for Big Ten fans and alumni across the country and around the world, allowing them to see their favorite teams, regardless of where they live.

On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011.

The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from Maryland and Rutgers on Nov. 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams.

In recent years the Big Ten has worked to meet the educational needs of modern student-athletes to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. In May of 2020, the conference announced the formation of the Big Ten Mental Health and Wellness Cabinet, featuring representation from all 14 member institutions, as well as sport affiliate members. The goal of the cabinet is to promote optimal mental health for Big Ten student-athletes through a comprehensive, systemic and interdisciplinary approach to establishing mental health programs, while also providing counsel, advice and expertise to the conference office.

In June of 2020 the conference launched the Big Ten Equality Coalition. This group, which features student-athletes, coaches, athletic directors, chancellors, presidents and other members of the Big Ten family from all 14 member institutions, has a stated goal of seeking tangible ways to actively and constructively combat racism and hate around the world, while also empowering student-athletes to express their rights to free speech and peaceful protest. One product of conversations emerging from the coalition was the creation of the Big Ten Voter Registration Initiative. This non-partisan, conference-wide collaboration encourages student-athletes to take part in the electoral process and is led by a Voter Registration Committee that includes representatives from all 14 Big Ten institutions. The Voter Registration Committee has partnered with the National Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law to develop educational programming and outreach tools, and to collaborate with other established civic platforms.

On June 30, 2022, the Big Ten Conference furthered its legacy of transformation when the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) voted unanimously to admit UCLA and USC to the conference effective Aug. 2, 2024. Competition will begin for all conference sports in the 2024-25 academic year.

In July of 2022, the Big Ten traveled a delegation of student-athletes and administrators from its member institutions to Selma and Montgomery, Alabama, for an immersive experience entitled: "Big Life Series: Selma to Montgomery." The pilgrimage to one of the key centers of the civil rights movement was highlighted by a march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, which is the site of the 1965 Bloody Sunday attack. The delegation also visited the Montgomery Interpretive Center on the campus of Alabama State University to learn more about the profound impact that students had on the civil rights movement, and the significance of the Knight vs. Alabama landmark trial which ended the segregation of funding in higher education across the State of Alabama.

In April of 2023, the Big Ten announced that Petitti was selected as the conference's seventh commissioner. With nearly four decades of sports, business and media industry acumen, he served as deputy commissioner and chief operating officer of Major League Baseball and president and chief executive officer of MLB Network. A 14-time National Sports Emmy Award winner, Petitti also held senior executive roles at CBS Sports and ABC Sports overseeing rights acquisition deals for a variety of sports leagues and collegiate and professional sports events, including the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, regular season men's basketball, college football, NFL, PGA Tour, the Masters, U.S. Open Tennis Championships, and the Little League World Series, as well as leading in the creation of the Bowl Championship Series to determine college football's national champion.

On Aug. 4, 2023, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors voted unanimously to admit the University of Oregon and the University of Washington to the conference effective Aug. 2, 2024, with competition to begin in all sports for the 2024-25 academic year. With the schools' admission, Oregon and Washington would also join the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), a consortium of world-class research institutions dedicated to advancing their academic missions.

More than 125 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.

Former Nebraska's men's golfer and assistant coach Judd Cornell returned to his alma mater to lead the Husker program in August of 2022.

Cornell came back to Lincoln after spending three seasons (2019-22) as the head coach at Creighton. An Omaha native, Cornell was an assistant coach at Nebraska for six seasons, including his final two years in Lincoln as associate head coach (2017-18 and 2018-19).

Upon the announcement of his hiring on Aug. 11, 2022, Cornell immediately focused his attention on helping the Huskers improve.

"My family and I are thrilled to be back in Lincoln, and I can't wait to lead the Husker men's golf program," Cornell said. The Husker program has been climbing in the national standings the past several years, and we plan to keep moving forward in the years to come."

In Cornell's second season as Nebraska's head coach in 2023-24, he led the Huskers to their best Big Ten Tournament finish since 2019. The 2024 Huskers tied for seventh in a 14-team field at the Scioto Country Club in Columbus, Ohio, as seniors Will Marshall and Gentry Scheve both produced top-20 individual finishes.

Cornell's Huskers also produced the best single-season stroke average in school history (290.66) in 2023-24, while newcomer Hamish Murray tied for the fifth-best individual stroke average (72.69) in program history.

Cornell began to lay his foundation by leading the Huskers to five top-eight team finishes in 2022-23. Every Husker posted an individual stroke average of better than 76.1 during the season, while competition on a daily basis became the standard. Ten different Huskers played at least nine competitive rounds on the year.

The Huskers will feature returning letterwinners Reed Malleck, Hamish Murray, Davis Johnson, Grant Jabenis, Evan McDermott and Quinn Yost in 2024-25, along with newcomers Rudy Sautron, James Ackerman, Jackson Benge,

Brodie Cunningham and redshirt freshman Rhett Hughes.

Cornell, who took over the top spot at Creighton on Aug. 15, 2019, had his first season with the Jays cut short by the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite an early end to the spring, Cornell's first season featured strong performances from junior Nate Vontz, who led CU with a 73.40 scoring average in 2019-20. It was CU's best individual single-season scoring average since 2007-08.

Creighton continued to make strides in Cornell's second year, as the Jays' 296.67 scoring average in 2020-21 was the program's best since at least 2002-03. Vontz also continued to thrive under Cornell's tutelage with a 72.06 scoring average that ranked No. 2 in program history. Vontz went on to earn first-team All-BIG EAST honors. Charlie Zielinski, an Omaha native, added an impressive freshman season in 2020-21, capturing second-team All-BIG EAST accolades with his 73.56 stroke average. A third Bluejay, Jackson Thompson, qualified for the 2021 U.S. Amateur Championship at Oakmont.

With Vontz and Zielinski leading the way again in 2021-22, Cornell's Jays slashed 4.5 strokes per round off their 2020-21 average. Creighton, which finished with a 292.17 team average, also notched the three best team rounds in program history. The Bluejays won Stampede at the Creek in October of 2021 with an 836 (-28), including a program-best first round aggregate of 275 (-13). Vontz won the tournament with a 197 (-19), including individual rounds of 63 (-9) and 65 (-7). Vontz repeated as a first-team All-BIG EAST selection, while Zielinski repeated as a second-team all-conference honoree. Zielinski also earned a spot on the BIG EAST All-Tournament Team after a third-place individual finish at the league championship. Zielinski added a fourth-place finish at the Nebraska Amateur Championship and qualified for the U.S. Amateur Championship in Paramus, N.J. Another Bluejay, Shaun Campbell, a junior from Tauranga, New Zealand, claimed the 2022 Nebraska Amateur title with a 72-hole score of 282 (-2) at Firethorn Golf Club in Lincoln (July 25-28).

Off the course, Creighton's team led the BIG EAST with a 3.758 GPA, including three golfers who posted perfect 4.0 grade-point averages in the spring of 2021. The team's performance in the classroom earned Cornell's squad a second

straight BIG EAST Team Academic Excellence Award, which is presented to the program with the best GPA in each league sport.

Cornell's experience and extensive time with many of the top instructors throughout the United States played a huge role in the preparation and development on and off the course for the golfers he has coached. He worked with Michael Colgate in 2015-16 when Colgate qualified for the NCAA Regionals as an individual. In 2019, Cornell assisted Nebraska to its highest Big Ten finish in school history (5th), as well as its best finish at the Big Ten Match Play Championship (4th).

A member of the Golf Coaches Association of America (GCAA), Cornell also served as tournament director for the Git-R-Done Husker Invitational in 2019, NU's first home tournament in 12 years.

As a Husker golfer, Cornell was part of Nebraska's 2006 NCAA Regional team that included PGA Tour player Brady Schnell and PGA Tour Latino America winner Ty Capps. Cornell was a three-time team captain, a first-team Academic All-Big 12 honoree and the first recipient of the Dick Spangler Memorial Scholarship for his leadership on and off the golf course. He was named 2004 Nebraska Amateur Player of the Year and competed in some of the nation's top amateur events, including the U.S. Amateur, Western Amateur and North and South Amateur. During his time as a professional, Cornell had success on multiple tours such as the Hooters Tour, Egolf, Dakotas Tour, Gateway, Web.com and Adams tour where he was named 2007 Rookie of the Year and finished among the top 20 on the money list.

Cornell graduated from the University of Nebraska in 2007. He and his wife, Bridget, have two children, Michael (6) and Grace (4). His family includes his parents, Mike and Patti Cornell and his two sisters Katy and Meggie Cornell. His father Mike is Director of Instruction at Champions Run in Omaha. Mike has been named top golf instructor in the state of Nebraska and the Midwest region multiple times in more than 35 years in the golf business.

Minzel, a team captain as a golfer on the 2004 Nebraska Wesleyan team that qualified for the

NCAA Division III Championships, brings strong credentials and a passion for helping young players improve their games to the Husker staff.

A Lincoln High School graduate, Minzel earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Nebraska Wesleyan in 2004. He has worked professionally in private business since graduation, but he has remained extremely active in the Nebraska golf community.

From 2017 to 2019, Minzel was a tournament committee member for the Nebraska Golf Association. A three-time Nebraska Mid-Amateur champion with wins in 2010, 2011 and most recently in 2018, Minzel is also a two-time Nebraska Four-Ball champion (2011, 2015). In 2010, he was a member of USGA Nebraska State Team.

Following his senior season at Nebraska Wesleyan, Minzel was the 2004 Nebraska Match Play champion. He was also a Cleveland Golf All-America Scholar as a senior for the Prairie Wolves.

A three-time Class A state qualifier at Lincoln High (1997, 1998, 1999), Minzel spent his first two collegiate seasons helping Northeast Community College in Norfolk to NJCAA national tournament appearances in 2001 and 2002. He was a member of the South Dakota men's golf program in the fall of 2002 before transferring to Nebraska Wesleyan.

SENIOR (2023-24)

Reed Malleck was Nebraska's No. 2 finisher at the Visit Knoxville Collegiate (Sept. 8-10) to open his senior season. He produced a three-round total of 216 (72-71-73) to tie for 37th in an 84-player field on the par-70, 7,280-yard layout of the Tennessee National Golf Club in Loudon.

In his second tournament of the season at the Bearcat Invitational (Oct. 1-3), Malleck put up a season-best 69 (-2) in the second round on the par-71, 7,279-yard layout at the Coldstream Country Club in Cincinnati. He finished with a 54-hole score of 218 (+5) to tie for 40th overall.

Malleck earned another lineup spot at the Badger Invitational (Oct. 1-3), finishing with a three-round total of 222 (+6) to tie for 58th. He opened with a 71 (-1) on the par-72, 7,271-yard layout at the University Ridge Golf Club in Wisconsin. He helped the Huskers to a sixth-place team finish in an 18-team field.

At the Purdue Fall Invitational (Oct. 9-10), Malleck finished 54th with 222 strokes (+9) on the par-71, 7,275-yard layout at the Ackerman-Allen Golf Course in West Lafayette.

He opened the spring with a 162 (+18) at the rain-shortened Battle at Briar's Creek in Johns Island, S.C. (Feb. 5-6), before competing as an individual at the Stampede at the Creek in Omaha (April 8-9). He tied for 11th with a 223 (+7), including a season-best 69 (-3) in the final round on the 7,627-yard, par-72 layout at Indian Creek Golf Club.

Malleck closed his senior season with a 74.29 stroke average over 17 rounds in 2023-24.

JUNIOR (2022-23)

Malleck posted a 74.86 stroke average over 22 rounds in 2022-23. He opened his junior

campaign by tying for 72nd with a two-round total of 152 (79-73) at the Badger Invitational in Verona, Wis. (Sept. 12-13).

Malleck missed Nebraska's next two fall events with injury before returning to compete at the White Sands Invitational (Oct. 28-30). He tied for 46th with a then-career-best 219 (79-71-69) in the Bahamas that included a career-best-tying 69 (-3) in the final round.

After a slow start to the spring with a 236 at The Prestige in Palm Springs, Calif., Malleck rebounded to tie for 28th at the Desert Mountain Collegiate with a 223 (69-79-75) that included a career-best-tying 69 in the opening round. He matched that with another 69 in the final round at the Seahawk Intercollegiate (March 26-27) to finish with a then-career-best 216 (E) on his way to a tie for 36th.

Malleck notched another 69 in the second round at the Tiger Collegiate on his way to a career-best 211 (70-69-72) and a tie for 25th at the Club at Old Hawthorne in Columbia, Mo. It marked his third career-best tournament score in a span of five events. His 69 also helped the Huskers to a second-round team total of 274 (-14), which was the best round in school history.

He capped his season as Nebraska's top finisher at the Big Ten Championship (April 28-29) with a two-round total of 152 (79-73) to tie for 41st in Galloway, N.J. (April 28-29).

SOPHOMORE (2021-22)

Malleck made his Nebraska lineup debut in the season-opening Rod Myers Invitational (Sept. 11-12) and was NU's top individual finisher at the 14-team event. He tied for 41st with a then-career-best 223 (+7) in an 81-player field. Malleck's performance included an opening-round 71 (-1) on the par-72, 7,154-yard layout of the Duke University Golf Course. He added rounds of 74 and 78 to produce one of NU's counting scores in all three rounds.

He returned to the lineup at the Rich Harvest Farms Invitational in Sugar Grove, Ill. (Oct. 2-4), producing solid scores to finish at 224 (73-76-75) and tie for 63rd individually.

Malleck opened the spring with a perfect 3-0 record to lead Nebraska at the Big Ten Match Play in Palm Coast, Fla. (Feb. 5-6). He made his first stroke play appearance of the spring at the Stitch Intercollegiate in Raleigh, N.C. (April 8-9), where he tied for 40th with a 226 (71-75-80) while playing as an individual outside the Husker lineup. His opening-round 71 (-1) matched his then-career best. Malleck played outside the

lineup again at the Hawkeye Invitational on April 16-17, putting up a 225 (74-74-77) to tie for 39th. Malleck capped the season in the lineup at the Big Ten Championship, where he shot a 239 (74-80-85) to place 64th.

He finished the 2021-22 season with a 75.80 stroke average over 15 rounds.

FRESHMAN (2020-21)

Malleck got his first taste of collegiate action by tying for 34th in a 60-player field at the Git-R-Done Husker Invitational (April 17-18). He put up solid numbers with a three-round score of 224 (75-74-75) on the par-71, 7,040-yard layout at Firethorn Golf Club in Lincoln.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Ranked as the No. 1 golfer in the Class of 2020 in the state of Nebraska, Malleck enjoyed one of the best careers in York Duke golf history.

He holds the competitive course record at York Country Club after shooting a 62 (-8), which also set the 18-hole high school meet record.

Malleck tallied six high school invitational victories and 13 runner-up finishes during his three-year career. He was a first-team Nebraska Super-State selection as a junior in 2019, before the worldwide outbreak of the coronavirus forced the cancellation of his senior season of high school golf in 2020.

During the summer of 2020, Malleck captured the Nebraska Junior Match Play championship at Hillcrest Country Club in Lincoln. He fired a 68 (-4) in the qualifying round.

Malleck was the top point scorer at the 2019 Nebraska-Kansas Junior Cup Matches. A talented multi-sport athlete, Malleck was also a basketball letterwinner for the York Dukes.

PERSONAL

The son of Dan and Kay Malleck, Reed was born June 19, 2001, in Lincoln, Neb. Reed has three sisters, Erica, Erin and Elle. A finance major, Malleck earned his bachelor's degree from Nebraska in May of 2024. He was a GCAA Scholar All-American in 2024 and a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar in 2022. He is a three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection and a seven-time Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll choice. He was a member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2021, 2023 and 2024. He was a member of the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Committee in 2023-24. He was also a Big Ten Sportsmanship Award winner in 2023.

JUNIOR (2023-24)

Grant Jabenis opened his second season at Nebraska by shooting a 220 (+10) over three rounds at the Visit Knoxville Collegiate (Sept. 8-10). The junior from Omaha was Nebraska's No. 4 golfer in the lineup and matched fifth-year senior Will Marshall as NU's No. 3 finisher at the tournament, tying for 53rd overall after rounds of 77-73-70 on the par-72, 7,280-yard layout of the Tennessee National Golf Club in Loudon.

Jabenis competed as an individual at the Stampede at the Creek in Omaha (April 8-9), finishing 24th with a three-round total of 226 (+10). He closed with an even-par 72 on the 7,627-yard layout at Indian Creek Golf Club after opening the tournament with back-to-back rounds of 77.

He closed the season with a 74.33 stroke average over six rounds.

Jabenis was a leader for Nebraska off the course as a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and an Academic All-Big Ten selection in 2024.

SOPHOMORE (2022-23)

In his first season as a Husker, Jabenis made regular contributions to the lineup, competing in 20 rounds while posting a 74.50 stroke average.

He earned his first lineup appearance at the Purdue Fall Invitational (Oct. 10-11). The Omaha Westside product finished 33rd in Indiana, before closing the fall with a tie for 59th at the White Sands Bahamas Invitational.

His 74.83 stroke average helped Nebraska establish a record for fall stroke average (289.64).

Jabenis opened spring stroke play at The Prestige in Indio, Calif. (Feb. 20-22). He began with back-to-back rounds of 71 and finished in third place at 215 (-1) to match Nebraska's top individual finish of the season

He competed in the Husker lineup at the Desert Mountain Collegiate before notching a fifth-place finish at the Stampede at the Creek. His performance at Indian Creek in Elkhorn,

Neb., included a career-best second-round 67 (-5) to finish with a career-best 54-hole score of 210 (71-67-72, -6).

He took 28th at the Fighting Illini Spring Collegiate with a 226 (+13), before concluding the season with a 153 (80-73) over two rounds at the rain-shortened Big Ten Championship in Galloway, N.J. (April 28-29).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Jabenis helped Iowa Western CC to a third-place finish at the NJCAA District III Championships in April of 2021, carding a three-round total of 222. In the fall of 2020, Jabenis captured his first individual title and led the Reivers to a team championship at the Blue River Classic. During the spring, Jabenis took seventh individually to help the Reivers to a team title at the Eagle Spring Classic in Bartlesville, Okla.

Jabenis did not compete collegiately in 2021-22, delaying his continued collegiate enrollment while focusing on his game in Arizona.

At the Nebraska Amateur in July of 2020, Jabenis fired a 66 (-5) in the opening round at Happy Hollow Club in Omaha. He finished fourth with a four-round total of 287 (+3) that also included a third-round 69 (-2). Jabenis added a 10th-place finish at the 2021 Nebraska Amateur in Hastings.

As a junior in 2018, Jabenis tied for fifth at the Nebraska Class A High School Championship in Norfolk. He added a tie for 10th at the 2019 high school championship to help Omaha Westside tie for fifth in the team standings. He also tied for 16th as a sophomore in 2017 to help the Warriors to an eighth-place team finish.

JUNIOR (2023-24)

Hamish Murray made an instant impact in his first season in Nebraska's lineup. The junior from Sydney, Australia led Nebraska with a team-best 72.69 stroke average over 29 rounds.

Murray opened his Nebraska career by leading the Huskers and tying for ninth individually with a 211 (-2) at the Bearcat Invitational in Cincinnati (Sept. 18-19). He began his Big Red career with back-to-back rounds of 69 (-2) at the Coldstream Country Club before capping the tournament with a 72.

He added a strong second lineup appearance for the Big Red by tying for 19th as Nebraska's No. 2 finisher with a 215 (-1) at the Badger Invitational (Oct. 1-3). Murray opened with a 69 (-3) on the par-72, 7,271-yard layout at the University Ridge Golf Club in Wisconsin. He added an even-par 72 in the second round, before closing with a 74. He helped the Huskers to a sixth-place team finish in an 18-team field that featured six 2023 NCAA Regional teams.

At the Purdue Fall Invitational (Oct. 9-19), Murray notched another top-20 performance by tying for 17th with a 214 (+1) as Nebraska's No. 2 finisher in the lineup. He started off with a 73 (+2) and 70 (-1) on the first day and followed with an even-par 71 in the final round. He helped the Huskers to a top-five team finish in West Lafayette.

Murray wrapped up the fall season in a tie for 33rd at the Everett Buick GMC Classic (Oct. 16-17) in Little Rock. He finished with an even-par 216 (73-71-72) on the tournament to close the fall with a team-best 71.33 stroke average over 12 rounds.

He continued to be a leader for the Huskers in the spring, tying for 19th at the rain-shortened Battle at Briar's Creek (Feb. 5-6) with a 146 (+2) after back-to-back rounds of 73. He managed a tie for 35th with a

215 (+5) at The Gator in Gainesville, Fla. (Feb. 16-17), which included a 69 (-1) in the second round.

Murray notched his fifth top-20 performance of the season with a tie for 19th with a 214 (-2) at The Johnnie-O at Sea Island (March 11-12). He matched his Nebraska career-best with a 69 (-3) for the fifth time in the second round, which was sandwiched between rounds of 73 and 72.

He finished 30th with a 227 (+11) at the Calusa Cup in Naples, Fla. (April 8-9), before tying for 51st as Nebraska's No. 3 finisher at the Hawkeye Invitational (April 13-14). Murray closed with a season-best-matching 69 on the par-71, 7,197-yard layout of the Finkbine Golf Course in Iowa City to finish at 218 (+5).

Murray ended his season with a tie for 52nd at the Big Ten Championship with a three-round total of 232 (+22) on a par-70, 7,240-yard layout at the Scioto Country Club in Columbus, Ohio. He managed rounds of 76, 80 and 76 to tie teammate Harry Crockett for Nebraska's third-best individual score. Murray helped the Huskers to a tie for seventh in a 14-team field.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Murray came to Nebraska after two strong collegiate seasons at NCAA Division II Cameron University in Lawton, Okla.

In 24 career tournaments, Murray never totaled higher than 227, while amassing six top-five finishes, nine top-10 performances and top-25 showings in 19-of-24 tournaments.

As a sophomore in 2022-23, Murray was named Cameron's Athlete of the Year across all sports after posting a 71.95 stroke average over 37 rounds. He notched top-25 finishes in 11 of 12 tournaments, while breaking his own school record with 128 birdies on the

season. He produced five top-10 finishes, including a season-best tie for third at the Hrnrciar (Oct. 17-18). He added a top-five finish with a tie for fourth at the Lone Star Men's Championship with a 213 that included a career-best-tying 67 for the fourth time in his career. Murray also fired a season-best 207 (68-72-67) to finish three-under-par in seventh place at the Ryan Palmer Foundation Invitational (Oct. 3-4).

He closed the season with a tie for eighth with a 214 (74-69-71) to finish two-under-par at the NCAA Division II West/South Central Regional (May 11-13). He finished the year ranked No. 3 in the region and No. 47 nationally by Golfstat, while helping Cameron to a final No. 15 national ranking by Golfstat.

A model of consistency, Murray's highest three-round tournament total of the season was 222, which came with a tie for 11th at the Rattler Invitational (Feb. 20-21) and a tie for 14th at the King-Alfred Invitational (March 20-21).

He earned second-team Lone Star honors on the course and excelled in the classroom to win the Lone Star Academic Player of the Year award.

As a freshman at Cameron in 2021-22, Murray competed in all 13 tournaments for the Aggies while posting a team-best 72.70 stroke average. Murray was ranked No. 19 regionally and No. 166 in NCAA Division II by Golfstat.

The Lone Star Conference Freshman of the Year, Murray produced four top-five efforts, including a runner-up finish at the Oak Tree Invite (March 14-15) with a 213 (72-69-72). He added third-place finishes at The Hrnrciar (Oct. 18-19) and the DBU Men's Classic (April 4-5), when he carded a career-best 206 (68-71-67) including a career-best, final-round 67 (-5).

He closed the year with a tie for 42nd with a 215 (71-71-73) at the NCAA West/South Central Regional (May 5-7). He set the Cameron record with 116 birdies as a freshman while tying the school single-season record with six eagles.

Murray went to Cameron after competing for the New South Wales Development Squad in Sydney, Australia. A 2020 New South Wales Sports Leadership Award winner, Murray fired a low round of 66 on his way to a tie for fifth at the adidas Junior 6's National Final. He was also the 2020 Pennant Hills Junior Champion before winning the 2021 Massey Park Cup Championship.

The son of David and Michelle Murray, Hamish was born June 26, 2002, in Sydney, Australia. He has an older sister, Madi. The child, youth and family studies major was a 2024 GCAA Scholar All-American and earned spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the fall and spring semesters of 2023-24 with perfect 4.0 grade-point averages. SOPHOMORE (2023-24)

Davis Johnson produced the best tournament of his collegiate career by claiming medalist honors at the Stampede at the Creek in Omaha (April 8-9). Playing as an individual, Johnson fired a one-under-par 215 over three rounds on a par-72, 7,627-yard layout at Indian Creek Golf Course to edge teammate Quinn Yost by one stroke. Johnson's performance included a career-best 69 (-3) in the opening round, before adding rounds of 72 and 74 to hold off Yost for the title.

Johnson's performance in Omaha followed his first lineup appearance of the season for the Huskers at The Johnnie-O at Sea Island (March 11-12). He was Nebraska's No. 4 finisher on the 7,060-yard, par-72 layout of the Plantation Course at the Sea Island Golf Club in St. Simons Island, Ga., tying for 58th with a 222 (+6) that included rounds of 75, 72 and 75.

He earned his second lineup spot of the season at the Hawkeye Invitational (April 13-14), where he tied for 69th with a three-round total of 221 (+8) on a par-71, 7,197-yard layout at the Finkbine Golf Course. Johnson opened the tournament with a 73, before managing a second-round 77 ahead of a strong final-round 71 to help the Huskers to a seventh-place finish in a 16-team field.

Johnson capped the season with a tie for 57th at the Big Ten Championship in Columbus, Ohio (April 26-28). He produced rounds of 75, 78 and 81 to finish at 234 (+24) on the par-70, 7,240-yard layout of the Scioto Country Club to help Nebraska tie for seventh in a 14-team field at the conference tournament.

Davis competed outside the Husker lineup at the TPC Badger Individual at TPC Wisconsin (Oct. 1-2). He carded rounds of 80, 77 and 82 to finish in a tie for 20th at 229 (+13).

Johnson closed the year with a 74.73 stroke average over 15 rounds.

FRESHMAN (2022-23)

Johnson made his debut as a true freshman at the Purdue Fall Invitational (West Lafayette, Ind.) Oct. 10-11. He tied for 36th with a three-round tally of 231 (+15).

At the Tiger Collegiate in Columbia, Mo., Johnson turned in his best performance of the season, tying for 47th with a three-round score of 218 (+2). His effort included a two-under 71 in the second round to help Nebraska to its best round in school history (274, -14).

Johnson then appeared in the Fighting Illini Spring Collegiate, where he finished tied for 40th. He accumulated a three-round score of 230 (78-75-77) on the par-71, 7,538-yard layout at the Atkins Golf Club.

He concluded his true freshman season at the Big Ten Championships in Galloway, N.J. He finished with a 157 (+15) over two rounds before the third round was canceled by rain. Johnson finished with a 76.00 stroke average in 11 rounds.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

As one of the top golfers in Minnesota, Johnson took second as a senior at the 2021

Metro West Conference Championships, which included a four-under-par 68 in the opening round to help Chaska capture the team title with a nine-stroke victory over Minnetonka.

Johnson was also named the 2021 Metro West Conference Player of the Year before helping Chaska to its seventh consecutive conference championship.

Johnson, who graduated from Chaska High School in 2021, chose to delay his enrollment after high school and spent the 2021-22 season in Arizona.

SOPHOMORE (2023-24)

Quinn Yost produced his first career top-10 finish while making his first lineup appearance of the season for the Huskers at the Badger Invitational (Oct. 1-3). The sophomore from Farmington, N.M., fired a career-best three-round total of 212 (-4) on the par-72, 7,271-yard layout of the University Ridge Golf Club in Wisconsin. He led Nebraska's lineup by tying for ninth individually, including a 69 (-3) to open the tournament. He added an even-par 72 in the second round, before closing the tournament with a 71 (-1). He helped the Huskers to a sixth-place team finish in an 18-team field that included six 2023 NCAA Regional qualifiers.

In his second appearance in the Husker lineup, Yost added another top-20 finish at the Purdue Fall Invitational. He added a career-low round on the first day, shooting a 68 (-3) on the par-71 7,275-yard layout at the Ackerman-Allen Golf Course in West Lafayette. He posted scores of 74 (+3) and 72 (+1) to finish at 214 (+1), tying for 17th.

Yost produced his best performance of the spring with a tie for second with an even-par 216 while playing as an individual at the Stampede at the Creek (April 8-9). Yost's career-best finish came on a par-72, 7,627-yard layout at Indian Creek Golf Club in Omaha and included rounds of 71, 75 and 70, as he finished just one shot back of teammate and champion Davis Johnson.

Yost's performance earned him a lineup spot at the Hawkeye Invitational (April 13-14), where he tied for 57th with a 219 (+6) on a par-71, 7,197-yard layout at the Finkbine Golf Course. Yost's effort in Iowa City included a career-best-tying 68 in the second round, sandwiched between rounds of 75 and 76.

Yost was Nebraska's substitute at the 2024 Big Ten Championship at Scioto Country Club in Columbus, Ohio (April 26-28) but did not compete in the event.

He opened his spring with a lineup appearance for the Huskers at The Gator (Feb. 16-17), where he managed a 226 (+16) on the par-70, 6,701-yard layout at the Mark Bostick Golf Course in Gainesville,

Fla. He tied for 75th with rounds of 73, 74 and 79 as Nebraska's No. 4 finisher.

Yost was back in the lineup at The Johnnie-O at Sea Island (March 11-12), tying for 76th as NU's No. 5 finisher at 227 (+11) with rounds of 71, 76 and 80 on a par-72, 7,060-yard course at the Sea Island Golf Club in St. Simons Island, Ga.

Yost closed the fall season with a 227 (+11) at the Everett Buick GMC Classic (Oct. 16-17) in Little Rock, Ark., where he tied for 68th with rounds of 77, 76 and 74 as NU's No. 5 finisher.

Yost finished the season fourth on the team with a 73.38 stroke average over 21 rounds in 2023-24.

FRESHMAN (2022-23)

Yost competed for lineup time throughout his freshman season at Nebraska, finishing with a 76.06 stroke average over 17 rounds for the Huskers in 2022-23.

Yost earned the No. 3 lineup spot at the season-opening Badger Invitational in Wisconsin (Sept. 11-13). He tied for 20th as Nebraska's No. 2 finisher at the rain-shortened event with a 143 (74-69), including a career-best 69 (-2) in the second round.

He was back in the lineup for the William H. Tucker Intercollegiate in his home state of New Mexico (Sept. 23-24), where he tied for 45th and second among the Huskers at 222 (74-78-70).

Yost closed the fall by carding a 231 (79-79-73) to finish 71st at the White Sands Invitational at Paradise Island, Bahamas (Oct. 28-30).

After going 0-2 at the Big Ten Match Play to open the spring, Yost was the No. 5 finisher in Nebraska's lineup at The Prestige in Palm Springs, Calif. (Feb. 20-22), tying for 112th at 237 (78-81-78).

He was back in the lineup at the Seahawk Intercollegiate (March 26-27), tying for 87th as NU's No. 5 finisher with a 238 (82-79-77).

Yost played his final tournament of the spring as an individual at the Stampede at The Creek in Elkhorn, Neb. (April 11-12). He notched a career best by tying for 17th with a 222 (73-74-75).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Yost produced the biggest win of his junior career by capturing the title at the Notah Begay III Junior Golf National Championships (Nov. 13-15, 2021) in Louisiana. Going head-to-head against some of the nation's best junior golfers, Yost fired a three-round score of 204 (-12) at Koasati Pines at the Coushatta Golf Course in Kinder, La. After shooting one-over-par 73 in the first round, Yost fired a 64 (-8) in the second round to match his career best. He secured the title with a final-round 67 (-5).

Yost added a third-place finish at the Tournament of Champions played at Walt Disney World - Palms in

Orlando, Fla., in December of 2020.

Yost, who was the top-ranked golfer in New Mexico according to Junior Golf Scoreboard, qualified for the national event on Aug. 7, 2021 by tying for first at the New Mexico Regional with even-par 144 over two rounds at the Twin Warriors Golf Club.

As a junior at Piedra Vista High School, Yost won the Class 5A individual state championship with a 67 (-5) over 18 holes. He helped Piedra Vista to a state runner-up finish as a team. He added a runner-up finish with an even-par 144 over two rounds at Twin Warriors Golf Club as a senior in 2022 to help Piedra Vista to a third-place team finish.

In May of 2021, Yost also won the Junior Americas Cup/IMG Junior World Qualifier with a two-round total of 140 after back-to-back rounds of 70 at the New Mexico Tech Golf Course.

Evan McDermott took a redshirt season in his second year as a Husker in 2023-24. Off the course, McDermott earned Academic All-Big Ten honors and was named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team. He also finished third behind champion Reed Malleck and runner-up Hamish Murray at the 2024 Nebraska Amateur Championship in July.

FRESHMAN (2022-23)

McDermott produced a solid season by tying for third among the Huskers with 20 rounds played while posting a 75.45 stroke average.

He made immediate contributions in the fall, competing in the Husker lineup at the Purdue and White Sands invitationals after playing as an individual outside the Husker lineup at the season-opening Badger Invitational.

McDermott capped the fall with a career-best 216 (67-74-75) that included a career-best 67 (-5) at the White Sands Invitational in Paradise

Island, Bahamas (Oct. 28-30). He tied for 32nd overall as NU's No. 3 finisher at the event. His effort in the Bahamas followed a tie for 41st at Purdue with a 228 (74-74-80), Oct. 10-11.

McDermott opened the season as Nebraska's top finisher by tying for sixth with a 148 (72-76) while playing as an individual at the rain-shortened Badger Invitational (Sept. 11-13).

He opened the spring by going 1-2 at the Big Ten Match Play, before carding a 232 (76-75-81) at The Prestige (Feb. 20-22). He was the No. 2 finisher in Nebraska's lineup in California, before earning his final lineup appearance of the year at the Desert Mountain Collegiate in Scottsdale (March 4-5). He was NU's No. 4 finisher in Arizona with a 234 (77-75-82).

McDermott competed as an individual at the Stampede at the Creek in Elkhorn (April 11-12), where he finished 13th with a 220 that included back-to-back 70s (-2) in the first and second rounds before settling for a final-round 80.

OUTLOOK (2024-25)

One of the top newcomers in NCAA Division II in 2023-24, Rudy Sautron joins the Huskers for the 2024-25 season after signing with Nebraska in early March. The former vice champion of France was named to the Golf Coaches Association of America Division II All-Freshman Team after producing eight top-10 finishes in 11 tournaments.

"Rudy is a strong young player and a great student," Nebraska Head Coach Judd Cornell said. "He has a year of college golf under his belt, so that experience should help him moving forward to Division I golf. I'm very excited to watch him develop the next three years and gain experience at the highest level. He has all the skills to be a phenomenal player."

Sautron claimed one of five spots on the NCAA Division II All-Freshman Team selected by the GCAA after qualifying as an individual to the NCAA Division II West/South Central Super Regional. He was also named to the Division II PING All-South Central Region team.

Sautron followed former Cameron golfer Hamish Murray to Nebraska, after Murray joined the Huskers for the 2023-24 season. Murray led the Big Red with a 72.69 stroke average over 29 rounds in his first season. Sautron and Murray were not teammates at Cameron.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Sautron was named the Cameron University Freshman of the Year across all sports in his lone season at the school. The Lone Star Conference Freshman of the Year also claimed one of five spots on the GCAA NCAA Division II All-Freshman Team for his play throughout the season. Sautron qualified as an individual to the NCAA Division II West/South Central Super Regional and was a member of the PING Division II All-South Central Region team. Sautron tied for 42nd individually at the Super Regional with a three-round total of 219 (+6), including rounds

of 73, 75 and 71 on the par-71, 7,242-yard layout of the University of New Mexico Golf Course in Las Cruces (May 9-11).

Sautron took third at the Lone Star Championships with a 54-hole score of 210 (-6) on a 7,157-yard, par-72 layout at the WinStar Golf Club in Thackerville, Okla. (April 22-23). Sautron fired back-to-back rounds of 69 (-3) to open the tournament before adding an even-par 72 in the final round. His conference championship finish marked his eighth top-10 showing of the season, including four top-five performances.

Sautron, who finished in the top 10 individually in all five of Cameron's fall tournaments, won the Hrcnciar Tournament at the Territory Golf Club in Duncan, Okla. (Oct. 16-17), firing a seven-under-par 209 through three rounds, including an opening-round 66 (-6).

He fired a career-best 65 (-7) in the first round of the GAC Preview at Lake Hefner North Golf Club in Oklahoma City. He finished in a tie for

ninth at 208 (-8) to help Cameron to a team championship. He shot a 207 (-9), including a second-round 67 (-5) to tie for sixth individually at the Missouri Southern State Men's Fall Invitational at the Shangri-La Country Club in Monkey Island, Okla. (Sept. 25-26).

Sautron followed with a third-place finish at three-under-par over two rounds (69-70) at the Ryan Palmer Foundation Invitational at the Amarillo Country Club (Oct. 2-3). He closed the fall with a tie for ninth individually with an even-par 213 (71-68-74) at the Copperhead Championship at the Innisbrook Golf Club in Palm Harbor, Fla. (Oct. 23-24).

After struggling to a tie for 45th at 234 (+18) at the Houston Classic (Feb. 12-13), Sautron bounced back with another top-five finish at the Midwestern State Invitational on a 6,882-yard, par-71 course at the Wichita Falls Country Club in Texas (March 25-26). He posted a three-round total of 215 (+2) that included rounds of 73, 74 and 68 (-3).

He added his sixth top-10 finish in seven collegiate events with an eighth-place finish at the Rattler Invitational at the Dominion Country Club in San Antonio, Texas (Feb. 19-20). He finished with a three-round total of 217 (+1).

Sautron notched his seventh top-25 showing with a 23rd-place finish with a 226 (+16) at the Oak Tree Invitational in Edmond, Okla. (March 18-19), where he managed rounds of 73, 75 and 78 on a par-70, 7,116-yard course at the Oak Tree Country Club, before closing the regular season with a tie for 28th with a 215 (-1) at the RJGA Palm Valley Classic in Goodyear, Ariz. (April 8-9), including rounds of 73, 72 and 70 (-2) on a 7,015-yard layout at Palm Valley.

Over 32 rounds (2,297 strokes, +6) in his first collegiate season, Sautron posted a 71.78 stroke average. In his 11 tournaments, he played 16 of his 32 rounds better than par.

Hughes comes to Nebraska after a strong high school career in Oklahoma. The four-year varsity golfer out of Edmond Santa Fe High School produced a 10th-place finish at the

2022 Oklahoma Class 6A High School State Championship as a junior in 2022.

Hughes added a tie for 33rd at the state tournament as a senior. A three-time All-Central Oklahoma Athletic Conference performer on the course, Hughes added a runner-up finish at the Oklahoma Boys Junior Amateur in 2022.

He also placed third at the Red River Challenge, which consists of the top juniors in Texas and Oklahoma.

"It's been great getting to know Rhett and he's going to be a fantastic fit to our program," Nebraska Head Coach Judd Cornell said. "He will have a great opportunity to play and really grow as a player. He's shown that he can compete with some of the top juniors in the country on multiple occasions and I'm really excited for him because he's going to have a great career here."

Hughes also placed fourth at the AJGA GreatLife Junior Challenge along with finishing 10th at the Oklahoma 6A-1 State Championships.

PERSONAL

The son of Nick and Ashley Hughes and Lisa and Jeff Adams, Rhett was born April 5, 2005. He has a brother, Chase Hughes, and sisters Bree Hughes and Emmy Adams. A finance major, Rhett earned a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the spring of 2024.

Hughes chose Nebraska over Grand Canyon and Pacific.

"It's closer to home, it's a higher level of competition, and I've always loved Lincoln and its environment," Hughes said. "I've always wanted to play in a Power Conference."

James Ackerman comes to Nebraska from Leawood, Kan., where he was one of the top high school and junior golfers in the state. The 2023 Kansas Class 6A Player of the Year as a junior at Blue Valley High School, Ackerman tied for third with a 142 (-2), including an opening-round 67 (-5) at the 2024 Class 6A state championship, helping Blue Valley to a fourth-place team finish. Ackerman also took third at the Kansas Class 6A state tournament as a sophomore in 2022. He helped the Tigers to state team championships in 2021 and 2022.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

The 2023 Kansas Class 6A Player of the Year, Ackerman helped Blue Valley High School to back-to-back state championships in 2021 and 2022. He tied for third individually at the state tournament as a senior in 2024, after also taking third as a sophomore in 2022. He tied for sixth as a freshman in 2021 and added a tie for eighth at state as a junior after winning the 2023 Eastern Kansas League individual title.

Following his sophomore season, Ackerman competed at the 2022 U.S. Junior Amateur at Brandon Dunes in Oregon and also qualified for the 2022 Notah Begay III National Championship, earning a spot with a win at the Kansas Regional Qualifier at Firekeeper Golf Course with back-to-back rounds of 70 (-2) to finish at 140 (-4). Husker teammate Rhett Hughes tied for fourth at the same qualifier with a 147.

PERSONAL

Ackerman is majoring in finance at Nebraska. A high-performing student, Ackerman was a 2023 AJGA Rolex Scholastic Honor Roll selection and carried better than a 4.2 weighted GPA at Blue Valley High School.

He chose Nebraska over Kansas, Kansas State, Iowa and Iowa State.

"I chose Nebraska because I felt a family environment with the Husker Athletic Department and developed a great relationship with both Coach Cornell and Coach Minzel right from the beginning," Ackerman said. "There was also a strong sense of camaraderie on the Nebraska golf team, and the other athletes immediately made me feel like part of the team. I am excited about the opportunity to help grow the program into a top tier Big Ten team competing at the national level."

Jackson Bengé makes the short journey from Omaha to Lincoln to continue a rich family tradition as a Husker. The Omaha Westside graduate helped the Warriors to back-to-back Class A state championships in 2023 and 2024, after producing the best scoring average in school history (70.9) for the Warriors. The two-time district champion also produced a pair of top-five individual finishes at the Class A state tournament.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

The two-time all-state selection (2022, 2023) led Omaha Westside to back-to-back Class A state team championships in 2023 and 2024, after helping the Warriors to a runner-up finish at the state tournament in 2022. He also helped Westside to three consecutive Class A-1 district titles in 2022, 2023 and 2024. Bengé captured back-to-back individual A-1 district championships before adding a runner-up finish to teammate Trevor Gutschewski in 2024. Bengé also helped power the Warriors to Metro Conference titles in 2023 and 2024, and a top-10 finish at nationals in 2023.

The 2022 Nebraska Junior Match Play champion, Bengé tied for third with a 218 (+2), including a second-round 66 (-6) at the 2024 Nebraska Junior Amateur at Awarii Dunes Golf Club in Axtell (June 10-12). He also tied for fourth with a 214 (-2) at the 2023 Nebraska Junior Amateur at Lochland Country Club in Hastings (July 10-12). He added a trip to the 2023 Junior Match Play quarterfinals at the Wayne Country Club.

Bengé was also selected to the Nebraska Golf Association Junior All-Star Team in both 2022 and 2023. He qualified for the 2022 U.S. Junior Amateur with a 64 (-8) to defeat runner-up and Omaha Westside teammate Kolby Brown by eight strokes.

PERSONAL

The son of Shawn and Amy (Roux) Bengé, Jackson has a younger sister, Addison. Jackson's mother was a four-year women's golf letter winner who helped Nebraska earn its first-ever team appearance at the NCAA Championship in 2000. She was also a four-time Academic All-Big 12 selection from 1998 to 2001.

Bengé is also a cousin to Husker baseball All-American (2003-05) and Major League Gold Glove winner and World Series champion Alex Gordon, along with being the nephew of Husker men's gymnastics All-American Ted Harris (1994-97).

Bengé, who was a four-year honor roll member at Omaha Westside, is majoring in business administration at Nebraska.

He chose the Huskers over Iowa, Kansas, Clemson, Minnesota, Grand Canyon, Creighton, Kansas State and Michigan State.

"I chose Nebraska because it has always been home to me," Bengé said. "I have been a Husker since Day 1, and I wanted to keep my talents with my home school. Being a legacy is awesome, and I can't wait to create my own legacy. I felt like Nebraska was the place where I could get better and get my game ready for the next level with all of the resources they have to offer. I also have a great relationship with both Coach Cornell and Coach Minzel, and I feel like they are going to get the program back to where it once was."

OUTLOOK (2024-25)

Brodie Cunningham is one of two international golfers among Nebraska's four newcomers for the 2024-25 season. Cunningham, who signed with the Huskers as a 16-year-old from Scotland in November of 2023, posted a pair of wins in international events during a three-week span in the summer of 2023, including the Barrie Douglas Scottish Junior Masters and The Foundations Trophy at Blairgowrie Golf Club.

He added another win at the Barrie Douglas Scottish Junior Masters Championship in 2024 in early June, before tying for second at the European Boys Amateur Team Championship

(Division 2) in Krakow, Poland in July. He added a top-10 individual finish at the 2024 Scottish Boys Open Championship in April, taking eighth.

He also competed at the Scottish Men's Open Championship at Muirfield in May of 2024, managing rounds of 72 and 73.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

In early June of 2023, Cunningham won the Barrie Douglas Scottish Junior Masters with a three-round total of 207 that included a second-round 63 at the Strathmore Golf Centre in Scotland. Less than three weeks later, he added a victory at The Foundations Trophy at Blairgowrie Golf Club in Scotland with a four-round total of 285 that included a third-round 67.

He added a fourth-place individual finish at the European Boys Team Championships in Slovakia, while also finishing sixth at the ProDreamUSA Junior Masters at Pollock Golf Club in Scotland

in early July. Overall, he produced seven top-10 individual finishes in 16 European tournaments from April to October of 2023.

PERSONAL

Cunningham, who enjoys playing the bagpipes, is majoring in finance at Nebraska.

"I chose Nebraska because of how well they treat their student-athletes in regards to helping them within the classroom, gym, nutrition and much more," Cunningham said. "Along with that is how nice the people are at Nebraska. They are constantly investing in their academic and athletic departments, which means they are always improving."





TROY DANNEN

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR FIRST YEAR

Troy Dannen, a leading voice in collegiate athletics with extensive experience as an athletic director and deep ties to the Midwest, is in his first year as Nebraska's Director of Athletics. Dannen was hired on March 20, 2024, and has hit the ground running in Lincoln.

Nebraska Athletics enjoyed success during Dannen's first championship season, as the Husker baseball program won its first Big Ten Tournament title and reached the 40-win plateau for the first time since 2014 while the Husker track teams put together impressive showings. The Husker men won the Big Ten Outdoor title and earned their best NCAA Championship finish since 2016 with a 13th-place finish, while the Husker women posted their second straight top-10 NCAA finish and placed ninth at the national meet. Nebraska finished 22nd in the final 2023-24 Learfield Director's Cup, the program's highest finish since 2010.

Dannen has been a leader in charting the course for a new era of collegiate athletics, serving from 2021 to 2023 as a member of the NCAA Constitution Committee and the Division I Transformation Committee. Dannen also previously served as the chair of the NCAA Football Competition Committee and was an Executive Committee member of the Football Oversight Committee. In total, Dannen has served on seven NCAA committees.

In 2022, Dannen was a finalist for Sports Business Journal's Athletic Director of the Year award, and he received the Distinguished American Award from the Sugar Bowl Chapter of the National Football Foundation.

Dannen came to Lincoln after serving as Director of Athletics at the University of Washington. He helped guide the Huskies' transition to the Big Ten Conference and oversaw a football program that reached the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in January of 2024.

He arrived at Washington in the fall of 2023 after serving as Director of Athletics at Tulane University since 2015. While at Tulane, Green Wave student-athletes earned 49 All-America honors, a national championship, 21 conference championships and 41 postseason appearances.

In 2022-23, Tulane football won its first American Athletic Conference football championship and won the Cotton Bowl over USC, which was ranked ninth in the nation at that time. The men's basketball program won 20 regular-season games for the first time in two decades. Additionally, men's tennis advanced to its sixth NCAA Tournament in seven years, both bowling and beach volleyball finished ranked in the top 20, and baseball won the conference championship.

Tulane's football program participated in an unprecedented three consecutive bowl games from 2018 to 2020, winning back-to-back bowl games for the first time in 128 years of football at the University.

In the classroom, Tulane student-athletes excelled at a high-level. At the end of the 2022-23 academic year, over 68 percent of Green Wave student-athletes earned a 3.0 GPA or better, with a 93 percent Graduation Success Rate and a record-setting department Academic Progress Report of 992, with seven teams earning a perfect 1000 APR score.

Dannen spearheaded fundraising efforts and numerous capital projects at Tulane. He helped secure the largest unrestricted gift in Tulane Athletics history, an endowment gift that funded the operation of a new sport (sailing), and a \$10 million lead gift for capital renovations, which was the second-largest gift in department history. In addition, marketing and licensing revenue grew four-fold, and in 2022-23, Tulane football, basketball and volleyball set ticket sales and revenue records. Under Dannen's leadership, the Green Wave Club Annual Fund grew by 40 percent in terms of donors, and 45 percent in terms of dollars.

Increases in fundraising and major gift donors positively impacted capital project development and completion. A \$13 million renovation to the

Reilly Natatorium, home of the swimming and diving program, as well as \$8 million in renovations to locker rooms and the sports medicine area inside the Wilson Center were completed in 2023. Dannen also oversaw construction of a new dining facility, weight room, basketball and volleyball locker rooms. Tulane also completed a \$2.4 million academic center renovation and a \$5 million television and digital production center.

Dannen came to Tulane after serving eight years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Northern Iowa (UNI) from 2008 to 2015. During his tenure, the Panthers enjoyed success at both the conference and national levels, highlighted by an NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in 2010 by the UNI men's basketball team. During his eight-year tenure, UNI was recognized with 39 All-Americans, 13 Coaches of the Year and nine Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) Players of the Year. UNI football, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball and softball combined to reach 15 NCAA tournaments and 20 postseason berths during that stretch. For his efforts, Dannen was recognized as NACDA's FCS Athletic Director of the Year in 2014.

Prior to his time at UNI, Dannen served as the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union's Executive Director for seven years, overseeing 400 high schools and 10 sports.

Dannen grew up on a farm just outside Marshalltown, Iowa, and graduated from UNI in 1989 with a degree in communications. He is married to Amy, and has four children: Elle, Emily, Holly and William.





ALEX HARRIS

ASSISTANT A.D./MARKETING & FAN EXPERIENCE

Alex Harris returned to Nebraska as the Assistant Athletic Director for Marketing and Fan Experience in September of 2021. Harris previously served as assistant director of marketing and fan experience at Nebraska from August of 2017 to September of 2019.

After leaving Nebraska in 2019, Harris was an associate director of marketing at Oklahoma. Harris also served at Kansas State, TCU and West Virginia.

In addition to his duties in the marketing office, which include key roles with the Nebraska football and men's basketball teams, Harris also serves as the sports supervisor for the Husker men's golf team.

Harris is originally from Abilene, Kan., and earned a bachelor's degree in business marketing from Kansas State as well as a master's degree in educational leadership from TCU.

Harris and his wife Karina, have a daughter, Kenlee, and a dog, Griffey.



CRAIG SAGER

DIRECTOR OF GOLF OPERATIONS

Craig Sager enters his first season as the director of men's and women's golf operations at Nebraska after spending the past four seasons as the head coach of the men's and women's programs at William Jewell in Liberty, Mo.

In 2024, he led the William Jewell men to their best finish in history at the GLVC Tournament. He also guided Bryson Oots to the first individual NCAA Division II national tournament appearance in program history.

In 2022, Sager helped Frida Hammarlund to an individual NCAA Tournament berth as well.

Sager took over the top job at William Jewell in January of 2020, and was selected to the

NCAA Division II Men's Golf Midwest Regional Advisory Committee in July of 2021, serving on the committee from 2022 through 2024.

Prior to his time at William Jewell, Sager spent three seasons leading the North Central Missouri College men's golf program. He led the Pirates to back-to-back NJCAA Region XVI Championships. Nine of his golfers earned trips to the national tournament, while also claiming six all-region and three all-district awards. His 2018 squad was the NJCAA Academic Team of the Year after producing the best GPA in the country. Ten of his golfers earned NJCAA All-Academic honors.

Sager was the course superintendent at the Riverside Country Club from 2010 to 2013, before serving as the general manager at the Green Hills Golf Course in Chillicothe, Mo., from 2013 to 2023. He was also the head professional at the Cameron Golf Club from 2010 to 2024.

A TPI Certified instructor, Sager is a native of Trenton, Mo. He earned his bachelor's degree in business management from Central Missouri in 2004.



ERIC JOHNSON

MEN'S GOLF STRENGTH COACH

Eric Johnson was hired as a fulltime assistant strength and conditioning coach in September of 2018 after serving as a strength and conditioning intern since July of 2016.

Johnson works with Nebraska's men's and women's golf, cross country, rifle and men's and women's tennis teams.

Prior to his time at Nebraska, Johnson was a strength and conditioning intern at the US Performance Center in Charlotte, N.C. from January through April in 2016. He worked with all age groups from elementary to professional athletes.

A Wallace, Neb., native, Johnson graduated from UNL with a degree in nutrition, exercise and health science. During his time as a student, Johnson was a student manager for Nebraska track and field team from 2007 to 2011.

COORDINATOR OF STUDENT-ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT

Alvin Banks serves as an academic counselor and the coordinator of student-athlete development for Nebraska's Academic Performance Team. Banks began working as an academic counselor at Nebraska in 2003, after serving two years as an assistant academic counselor.

As Nebraska's coordinator of student-athlete development, he provides academic, athletic,

personal and career counseling to all Husker student-athletes. As an academic counselor, he works primarily with the Nebraska men's and women's golf teams, the women's swimming and diving team and the wrestling team, while also assisting with the football team.

Before joining the Academic Performance Team, Banks served six years as a law enforcement officer for the City of Lincoln. He is

currently a member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics.

Banks, who lettered in football at Nebraska during the 1991 season, earned his master's degree in vocational education in 1998, after receiving a bachelor's degree in business management in 1992 from Nebraska. Banks and his wife, Lisa, have two children, Kaylie and Darius.



JAKE MICELI

PERFORMANCE NUTRITION

Jake Miceli enters his first season on Nebraska's Performance Nutrition Team. He will spend the 2024-25 season as an RD Fellow, working directly with the student-athletes and coaches on the men's golf team and the women's swimming and diving team.

Miceli comes to Nebraska from Illinois State, where he served as a sports nutrition intern for

the Redbirds. He also gained experience as a clinical intern at Carle Hospital in Peoria/Pekin, Ill., and as a food service intern at Unit 5 School District in Bloomington/Normal, Ill.

He previously served as a performance nutrition volunteer during the summer of 2021 at Northwestern University.

A registered dietitian, Miceli earned his bachelor's degree in food, nutrition and dietetics from Illinois State in 2022. He earned his master's degree in food, nutrition and dietetics from Illinois State in 2023.



ZACH SMITH

ASSISTANT EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Zach Smith is in his first season with the Nebraska equipment staff in 2024-25, bringing extensive experience in the industry.

He spent 10 years at the University of Northern Iowa, serving the last five as an athletic equipment manager. In that role, Smith oversaw equipment operations for all 17 university-sponsored sports, managed inventory, was the primary point of contact on the school's Nike contract and trained other staff in the department. Smith transitioned

into that role after five years as an assistant equipment manager at UNI.

Before his time at UNI, Smith was the Iowa Barnstormers' head equipment manager for eight months in 2014.

From 2016 to 2024, Smith was also the assistant director of equipment operations for the East-West Shrine Bowl. In that role, Smith worked with game officials to contact invitees and equipment managers, ensured practices

were staffed, coordinated locker room setup and installed coach-to-player radio communication in the helmets of both teams.

The Fremont, Neb., native has over 20 years of experience, including time with the Detroit Lions, Miami Dolphins and San Francisco 49ers. He obtained a sports management degree from Iowa State in 2006, where he was a student manager with the football team for four years.



RODNEY BENNETT

UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA-LINCOLN CHANCELLOR SECOND YEAR

Dr. Rodney D. Bennett began his work as the 21st chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on July 1, 2023. He is a 30-year veteran of higher education with a track record of growing research, increasing student success and building impactful partnerships.

In his first year at Nebraska, the University experienced rising retention and graduation rates, demonstrated positive signs related to enrollment, and expanded its research and creative activity efforts. In the fall of 2023, almost 4,700 first-time freshmen enrolled at UNL—an increase of 1.3 percent from 2022.

Spring 2024 overall enrollment reversed a trend of five straight years of spring enrollment declines.

Over the last five years, UNL retention from first to second year has increased 2.3 percent and the four-year graduation rate has increased more than 8.5 percent.

In 2023, the university's total research expenditures grew to \$366 million, a 37 percent increase over the past decade. UNL has also experienced tremendous growth in externally sponsored federal funding, increasing to a record \$163 million in 2023.

Chancellor Bennett came to Nebraska after nine years of successful leadership at the University of Southern Mississippi. During his tenure as president, USM was reclassified from a Carnegie R2 to an R1 university, signaling growth in research prestige and funding. Dr. Bennett also invested in programs to support student recruitment, retention and outcomes, including for the 30 percent of USM students who were first-generation.

His efforts led to an improvement in the university's six-year graduation rate.

Prior to his role at the University of Southern Mississippi, Dr. Bennett served at the University of Georgia for more than a decade. He was the senior administrator for student programs and services for Georgia's 34,000-plus students; oversaw \$150 million in capital projects; and made key staff and programmatic investments in extracurriculars, mental health programs and other areas to better support students.

Dr. Bennett has also been the dean of students at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina, and associate dean of student life at Middle Tennessee State University.

Chancellor Bennett values community leadership and service. He has served on numerous boards, including the Mississippi Aquarium, Northeast Georgia Girl Scouts of America, Catholic Health East (Philadelphia), and St. Mary's Health Care System in Athens, Georgia. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and Past Sire Archon for Sigma Pi Phi fraternity, The Boulé.

Dr. Bennett earned a bachelor's degree in mass communication, a master's degree in educational administration, and an education specialist degree from Middle Tennessee State. He earned his Doctor of Education degree from Tennessee State University.

He and his wife, Temple, are the parents of two adult daughters, Colby and Logan.



SCOTT FUESS JR.

FACULTY ATHLETIC REPRESENTATIVE FIFTH YEAR

Scott M. Fuess Jr. was named the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Faculty Athletics Representative on Feb. 21, 2020.

As faculty athletics representative, Fuess serves as a liaison between the Office of the Chancellor and Athletic Department. His areas of focus in the role include the welfare of student-athletes, NCAA and Big Ten Conference compliance, maintaining the positive relationship between athletics and faculty, developing and responding to NCAA legislative proposals and representing the university at related NCAA and Big Ten Conference meetings.

The half-time position - which was restructured to an expected term of five years - reports directly to Nebraska's President and consults with Athletic Director Troy Dannen. Fuess splits time between

faculty representative duties and academic responsibilities.

Fuess, the Steinhart Distinguished Professor of Business and former chair of the College of Business' economics department, has worked at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln since 1986. He serves on the Faculty Senate's Intercollegiate Athletics Committee, having chaired the committee for 2018-19 and a sub-committee in 2017-18. He also has served on numerous Big Ten Conference committees, including the Sports Management Committee, the Compliance and Reinstatement Committee and the Legislative Review Committee. For 2022-23 he served as Chair of the Big Ten Compliance and Reinstatement Committee.

Fuess earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Delaware, as well as master's and

JEFFREY GOLD, M.D.

UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA PRESIDENT FIRST YEAR

Jeffrey P. Gold, M.D., became the ninth president of the University of Nebraska System on July 1, 2024, following a national search by the Board of Regents.

As president, Gold leads a four-campus university system that enrolls nearly 50,000 students and employs 16,000 faculty and staff on campuses in Lincoln, Omaha and Kearney, plus academic divisions and research and extension centers across the state. He serves as chief spokesman and chief executive officer for the system, which operates on a \$3 billion annual budget and includes a flagship Big Ten institution, a world-renowned academic health sciences center, Division I athletics programs, and preeminent institutes focused on water and agriculture, national security and defense, infectious disease and early childhood education.

He is a nationally recognized higher education and health care leader and advocate. He was the chancellor of the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) and board chair for the Nebraska

Medicine Health System from 2014 to 2024. As UNMC's chief operating officer, Dr. Gold was responsible for all aspects of campus leadership, program quality and operation—including 7 colleges, 37 institutes and centers, 5,429 faculty and staff and 4,700 health professions students.

In July 2021, Dr. Gold was named the Provost and Executive Vice President of the University of Nebraska System in addition to his ongoing UNMC/Nebraska Medicine responsibilities. In this role, he served as the chief academic officer of the University of Nebraska System and liaison to the Board of Regents for academic affairs. From May 2017 through June 2021, Dr. Gold served as the chancellor of the University of Nebraska at Omaha, the state's only public metropolitan university—a role he held concurrently with being UNMC's chancellor.

He holds tenured faculty appointments in UNMC's College of Medicine and in the College of Public Health, where his research interests in health care policy, population health and epidemiology

are concentrated. He has authored over 200 peer-reviewed manuscripts, 350 national presentations, 40 books and chapters and engaged in over 300 invited professorships and keynote presentations.

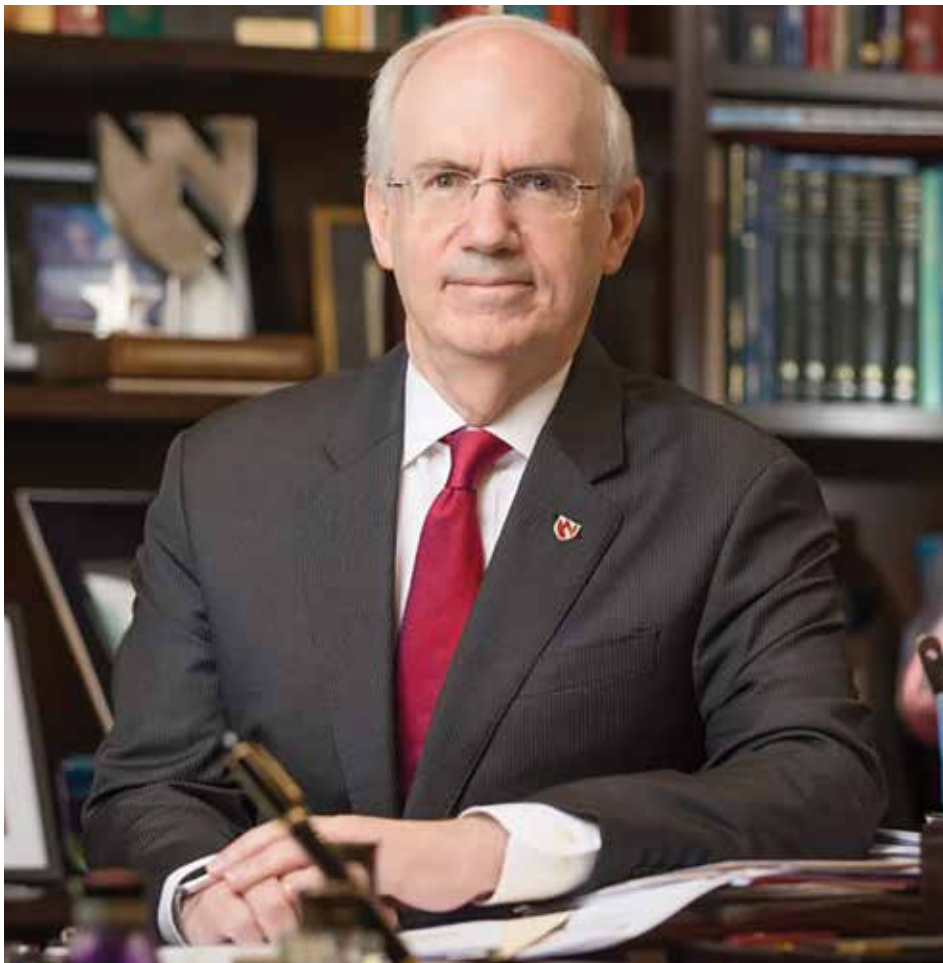
Dr. Gold is a first-generation student; he graduated from the Cornell University College of Engineering with a bachelor's degree in Theoretical and Applied Mechanics. He earned his M.D. from the Weill Cornell College of Medicine and completed his general surgery residency at The New York–Presbyterian Hospital and Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center. He completed his cardiothoracic surgical fellowship training at the Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, with additional training in pediatric cardiac surgery at the Boston Children's Hospital, both of the Harvard Medical School.

He has been certified by the American Board of Surgery and by the American Board of Thoracic Surgery, specializing in adult and pediatric cardiac surgery. Dr. Gold is licensed in Nebraska, Ohio, New York and New Jersey.

Dr. Gold leads several key economic development boards for the State and the University System, including the Greater Omaha Chamber, University Tech Development Corp, the University Tech Transfer Corp, and UNeTech Corp.

His national leadership roles have included more than 50 national professional committees and more than 100 national organizations, volunteer boards, government and public health councils. He has worked extensively with national- and state-level elected and appointed governing and administrative bodies as an advisor and trusted resource in the areas of higher education, research and clinical care.

Dr. Gold has been married for more than forty years to a medical school classmate. He has two adult children and two grandchildren.



NEBRASKA BOARD OF REGENTS



The Board of Regents consists of eight voting members elected by district for six-year terms, and four non-voting student Regents, one from each campus, who serve during their tenure as student body president. The board supervises the general operations of the university, and the control and direction of all expenditures. PERFORMANCE NUTRITION

The purpose of the Performance Nutrition department is to provide services that enhance the student-athlete's overall health and recovery.

GOALS

- To offer a variety of food and beverage products that are readily available and accessible for all student-athletes.
- To provide a wealth of education and resources that each student-athlete can utilize to enhance their overall level of knowledge and awareness as it pertains to fueling their body for competition and recovery.

DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

Performance Nutrition seeks to provide fueling options and education to Husker student-athletes, so they are adequately prepared and knowledgeable on the impact nutrition can have in their lives as athletes and after sport.

NUTRITION OVERVIEW

Our Training Table is the primary resource for student-athletes to seek out holistic fueling options. Our Training Table operates and sets its menus with a student-athlete first mentality. We seek to provide healthy, accommodating nutrition options for all our athletes at breakfast, lunch and dinner. The Training Table also features a demo kitchen, allowing our student-athletes to practice their culinary skills and learn more about making nutritious meals.

Our fueling stations are the secondary resource for student-athletes to fulfill their fueling needs. The primary goal of our fueling stations is to provide quick and easy sources of nutrition and hydration to supplement training and competition.

Husker Bucks are provided to student-athletes to supplement meals on their own. Athletes have the chance to purchase a meal at local restaurants or to use for groceries at the grocery store.

EDUCATION AND CONSULTATION

Each team has a sport specific dietician who oversees the nutritional needs per team. Our dietitians are great resources for education and consultation to our student-athletes. The dietitians conduct DEXAs for bone density and lean mass trending, hydration testing, consult with athletes individually, provide nutrition education team talks (hydration, pre-workout fueling, recovery nutrition), host cooking classes and grocery store tours, and assist with fueling options surrounding competitions.

HUSKERS & FLIK

Flik athletics specializes in fueling athletes. Flik Athletics currently fuels over 25 professional teams across NFL, NBA, WNBA, MLB, MLS and USL Championship league. Nebraska is the first college athletic program that has partnered with Flik. In partnership with team dietitians, trainers, and coaches, Flik's team of chefs and dietitians create customized hospitality services and programming that elevate the athlete's culinary experience.

ATHLETIC MEDICINE

ATHLETIC MEDICINE

Nebraska features one of the most well-trained and highly skilled athletic medicine staffs in the country. Under the guidance of Associate Athletic Director for Athletic Medicine Brandon Yoder and Football Head Athletic Trainer Chris Peduzzi, the Nebraska athletic medicine staff consists of 22 full-time athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers, as well as a team of primary care, sports medicine and orthopedic physicians.

Nebraska's medical facilities have long been among the nation's best, and the Husker football program moved into the Osborne Legacy Complex in 2023. The facility includes state-of-the-art equipment for the evaluation, diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation needs of the players. The athletic medicine staff continues to strive for growth with advanced coursework, allowing for innovation and research-based decisions to improve medical outcomes in conjunction with other athletic performance units to help create an all-encompassing health care model.

In addition to the Osborne Legacy Complex, the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex, Hawks Field, Bowlin Stadium, Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Bob Devaney Sports Center and the Nebraska Soccer and Tennis Complex all feature athletic medicine facilities.



SPORT PSYCHOLOGY

Continuing its commitment to complete care for all student-athletes, Nebraska has a staff of five in-house mental health providers specializing in performance psychology who work directly with student-athletes, teams and coaches. Under the leadership of Director of Sport Psychology Brianna Ward (above), the Huskers' sport psychology staff provides counseling, psychological services, mental skills training, team-building and leadership development services for each of Nebraska's 24 sports and more than 600 Husker student-athletes. The staff works directly with student-athletes to help them develop skills to enhance personal well-being, address mental health and train psychological skills to optimize performance.

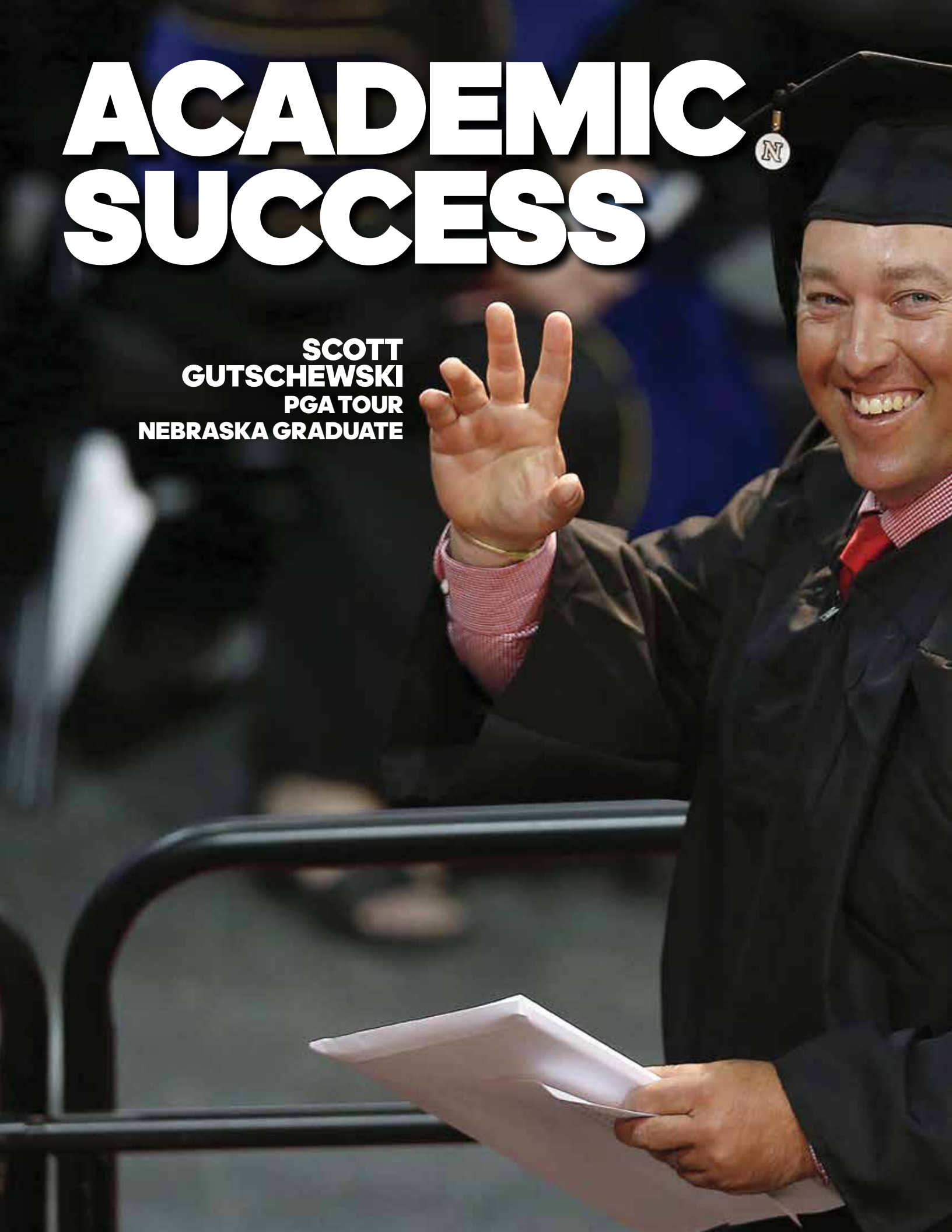

ACADEMIC COUNSELING

A team of 14 academic staff members are in place to monitor daily academic progress, promote skill development, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/registration process and monitor eligibility and progress toward graduation.

TUTORIAL SUPPORT

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, tutorial support is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. Tutorial support is provided both in-person and virtually. Nebraska's tutorial program is certified by the College Reading and Learning Association.

STUDY HALL

Student-athletes attend a supervised study hall within the newly-opened Osborne Legacy Complex that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week and/or a list of academic tasks as determined by their academic counselor, learning specialist and coach.

MENTORING

Academic staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes and select returning student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information and discuss academic success strategies.

EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a neuropsychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

COMPUTER RESOURCES

All student-athletes are provided the opportunity to have a laptop for use during their academic career at Nebraska. The Osborne Legacy Complex has printers and desktop computers available for student-athletes to use in the facility. A full-time computer specialist is on-site and available to assist with technology needs.

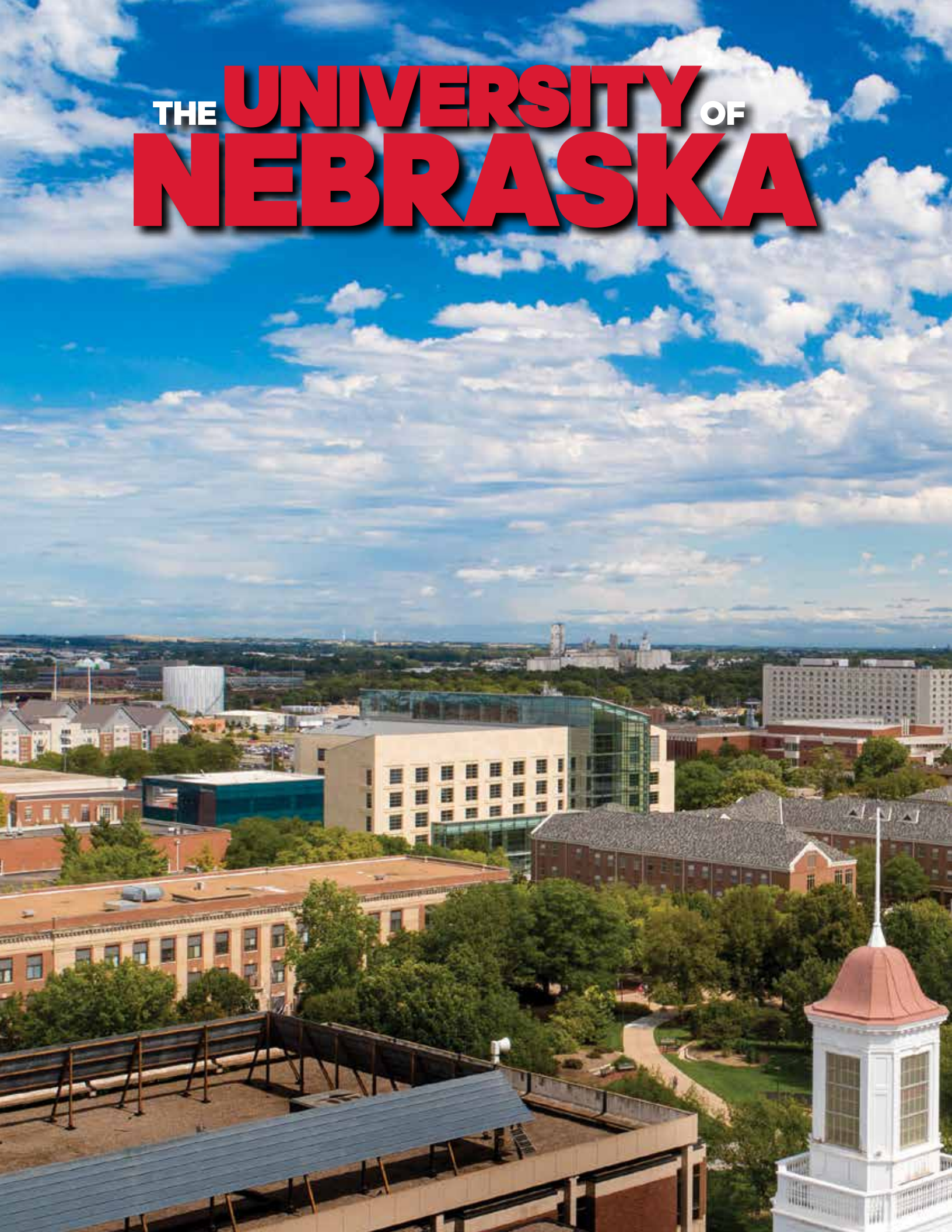

THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

Chartered in Lincoln by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a university system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration. The flagship University of Nebraska–Lincoln is an educational institution of international stature. Nebraska is classified within the Carnegie “R1: Doctoral Universities – Highest Research Activity” category. Nebraska is also a land-grant university and a member of the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities. The university is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission.

BIG TEN ACADEMIC ALLIANCE

As a member of the Big Ten, the University of Nebraska–Lincoln is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), which is the academic consortium of the universities in the Big Ten Conference. The BTAA includes all 18 Big Ten Institutions and partners with the University of Chicago. Being in the Big Ten Academic Alliance gives Nebraska several advantages, including: access to library collections across the conference, reduced costs through tech collaborations, lower student costs on course materials through collective purchasing and licensing, and study abroad partnerships and course-sharing agreements — students can take courses across Big Ten institutions.

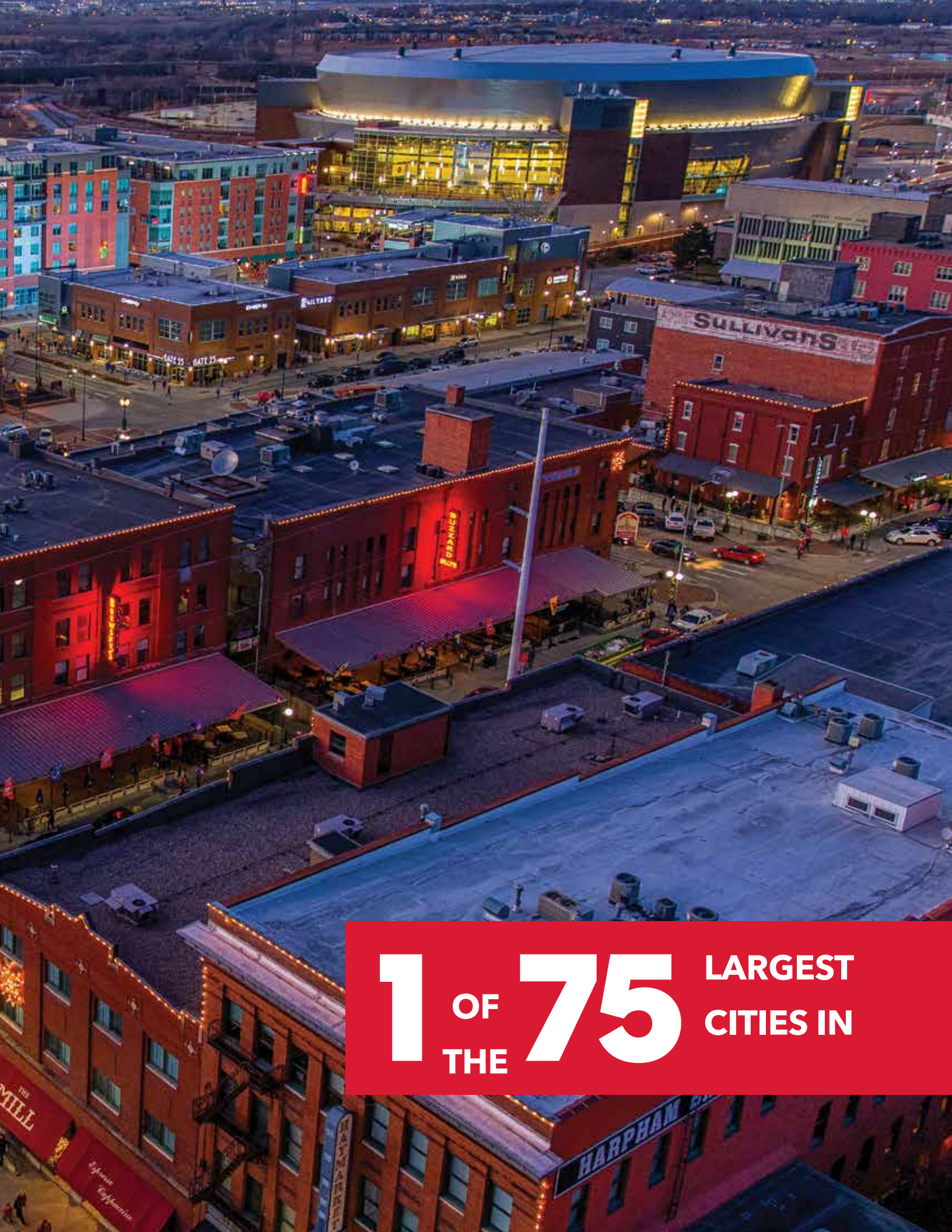

HUSKERS MAKE HISTORIC GAINS IN 2023-24



Hamish Murray produced a solid first season at Nebraska by producing five top-20 individual finishes in 2023-24. Murray closed the year with a team-best 72.69 stroke average while competing in 29 rounds for a Husker team that closed with a school-record 290.66 season stroke average.

The Nebraska men's golf team continued to show major improvements in its second season under Head Coach Judd Cornell in 2023-24.

The Huskers not only closed the year with a school-record 290.66 stroke average, they produced their best conference tournament finish since 2019.

The Big Red tied for seventh in a 14-team field at the Big Ten Championship at the Scioto Country Club in Columbus, Ohio, as seniors Will Marshall and Gentry Scheve both produced top-20 individual finishes.

Marshall, a fifth-year senior from Elburn, Ill., tied Scheve for 19th with three-round totals of 225 on a par-70, 7,240-yard layout.

Nebraska's two most consistent golfers throughout the season - junior Hamish Murray and senior Harry Crockett - added ties for 52nd at 232 to help the Huskers in Ohio.

Crockett closed his two-year Nebraska career with a school-record 72.49 stroke average, including a 72.72 average in 2023-24.

Murray added the sixth-best individual stroke average in school history with a 72.69 on the season. Murray's impressive debut season in Lincoln included five top-20 finishes, including a tie for ninth at the Bearcat Invitational (Sept. 18-19).

Crockett added a trio of top-20 finishes on the year, including a runner-up finish with a 203 (-10) to lead Nebraska at the Hawkeye Invitational in Iowa City (April 13-14). He added a tie for third with a 209 (-7) at the Everett Buick GMC Classic to close the fall season in Arkansas (Oct. 16-17).

Nebraska received other outstanding individual performances throughout the year, including a tournament title for Davis Johnson at the Stampede at the Creek. Johnson took the

individual championship in Omaha with a three-round total of 215 (-1) on a 7,627-yard course at Indian Creek, outlasting teammate Quinn Yost at even-par 216. Yost added another top-10 individual finish with his tie for ninth at 212 (-4) at the Badger Invitational in Wisconsin (Oct. 1-3).

Overall, Nebraska golfers claimed 19 individual top-20 finishes on the season, including six top-10 performances.

Scheve got the Huskers off to a solid start with his tie for 12th at the Visit Knoxville Collegiate (Sept. 8-10). His three-round total of 208 (-2) tied a career best and helped Nebraska to a ninth-place finish in a strong 14-team field.

Murray made his Husker debut the following week in Cincinnati, tying for ninth at 211 (-2) at the Bearcat Invitational. Murray's effort helped the Huskers to an 11th-place showing in a solid 17-team field.

Murray made it back-to-back top-20 efforts by tying for 19th at the Badger Invitational next time out, but Yost was Nebraska's top golfer at the tournament with his tie for ninth at 212 (-4) in Wisconsin.

Yost and Murray tied for 17th at 214 (+1) a week later at Purdue, trailing Crockett's tie for 12th at even-par 213. Scheve added a 215 (+2) to tie for 21st to put four Huskers in the top 25 in a 15-team field in West Lafayette. Nebraska's solid lineup play earned the Huskers a fifth-place team finish.

The Big Red closed the fall in Little Rock at the Everett Buick GMC Classic, where Crockett tied for third at 209 (-7) to help the Huskers to a tie for ninth in a 15-team tournament.

Murray and Evan Myers opened the spring with top-20 finishes to lead the Huskers at the rain-shortened Battle at Briar's Creek in South

Carolina (Feb. 5-6), before the Huskers competed at The Gator in Gainesville, Fla. (Feb. 16-17). The challenging conditions and strong field in Florida prevented the Huskers from notching a top-30 individual finish for the only tournament all season.

Murray and Myers were back in the top 20 individually at the Johnnie-O next time out in St. Simons Island, Ga. (March 11-12).

Following a team competition at the Calusa Cup and individual success at the the Stampede at the Creek (April 8-9), the Huskers closed the regular season highlighted by Crockett's runner-up finish at the Hawkeye Invitational (April 13-14). Crockett's 203 (-10) matched the best 54-hole score in school history, tying Brady Schnell's 203 (-13) at the Ron Moore Invitational in Goodyear, Ariz., in 2005-06.

Marshall produced his best tournament performance of the season at the Big Ten Championship, tying for 19th at 225. Scheve notched his second top-20 finish of the year by matching Marshall's effort, as Nebraska tied for seventh.

The Huskers also produced a strong season off the course, led by Murray's Academic All-District selection from the College Sports Communicators. Murray, Malleck and Yost added Scholastic All-America honors from the Golf Coaches Association of America (GCAA), while Grant Jabenis was named a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar. Jabenis, Malleck, Yost, Johnson, Marshall and Evan McDermott added Academic All-Big Ten accolades.

Marshall, a four-time Academic All-Big Ten choice in his career, also claimed a prestigious Sam Foltz 27 Hero Leadership Award for his contributions in the community.



Harry Crockett closed his two-year Nebraska career with a school-record 72.49 stroke average. As a senior in 2023-24, Crockett was the only Husker to compete in all 32 team rounds while posting a 72.72 stroke average. His 203 (-10) at the Hawkeye Invitational tied an 18-year-old Nebraska 54-hole record.

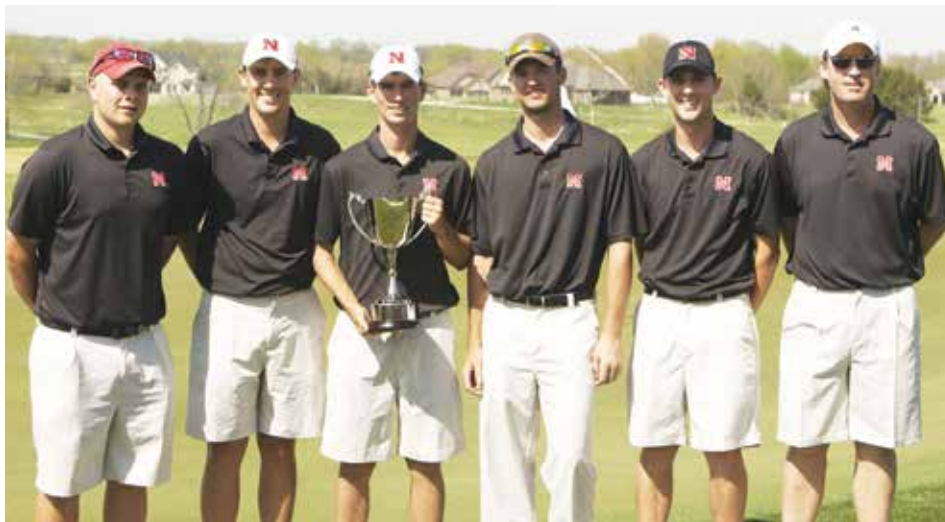

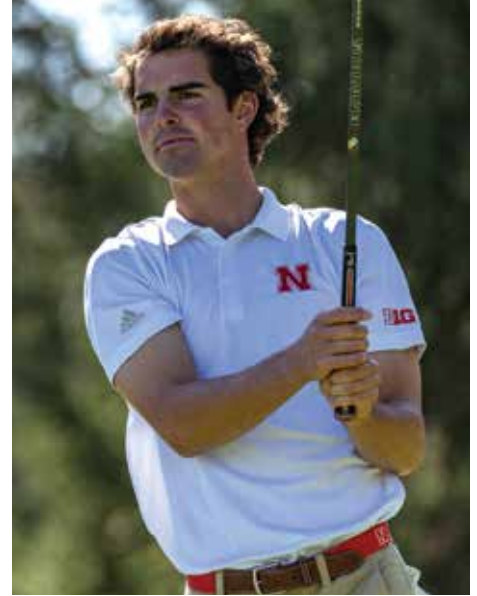

HUSKERS IN PROFESSIONAL GOLF

Brady Schnell (Omaha, Nebraska/Mesa, Arizona)

Brady Schnell claimed his PGA Tour card by finishing 22nd on the Web.com Tour money list in 2018. His \$178,081 in earnings in 2018 included a victory in the Wichita Open. Schnell, who is a graduate of Millard West High School, competed on the Web.com Tour from 2010 to 2018. In 2019, he earned more than \$200,000 on the PGA Tour. He finished 23rd at the AT&T Byron Nelson Classic in May, after taking 12th at the Corales Puntacana Resort & Club Championship in March. He competed on the Korn Ferry Tour in 2020 and 2021. He also owns a pair of PGA Latinoamerica Tour victories, and he competed on the PGA Tour Canada in 2009, when he shot an amazing 59 at the ATB Financial Classic in August of 2014. He became just the 16th player on a major professional tour in history to break 60 in a round. Schnell lists his home club as Superstition Mountain Golf and Country Club in Arizona. Schnell earned four letters at Nebraska (2004-07). He is now an instructor Firethorn Golf Club in Lincoln. He and his wife, Jenn, have two children, Harvey and Lyla.

Scott Gutschewski (Elkhorn, Nebraska)

One of the best professional golfers in Nebraska history, Scott Gutschewski was a three-year letterman at Nebraska in 1997, 1998 and 1999. He was also a member of the Huskers' most successful team - the 1999 squad that finished 14th at the NCAA Championships. Gutschewski spent several years on the Canadian Tour and the Nationwide Tour. He earned his first spot on the PGA Tour in 2005 after finishing 17th on the Nationwide Tour money list in 2004. He added PGA Tour seasons in 2006, 2007, 2009, 2011, 2022 and 2024. He finished in the top 25 on the Nationwide Tour in three separate seasons (2004, 2008, 2010). He earned his 2007 PGA Tour card through qualifying school. He returned to the University of Nebraska to earn his bachelor's degree in professional golf management in 2014. He continued to compete on the Korn Ferry Tour in 2019, 2020 and 2021, earning his PGA Tour card again for the 2021-22 season. He took fifth at the 2022 Barracuda Championship and added a tie for 18th at the Valero Texas Open. He also tied for 31st at the 3M Open. In 2022-23, Gutschewski finished in the top 30 on the Korn Ferry Tour, including a \$180,000 win at the LECOM Suncoast Classic (April 20-23) to return to the PGA Tour in 2024. He resides in Elkhorn, Neb., with his wife, Amy, and four children, Luke, Isabelle, Trevor and Isaiah. He grew up in Omaha.

Jeff Klein (Scottsbluff, Nebraska)

A former Husker who took a long road to the PGA Tour, Jeff Klein earned his PGA Tour card in 2003 at the age of 44. Klein, who was a member of the South African Tour in 1991, was also a member of the Champions Tour after his brief stint on the PGA Tour. In 2008, he shot a six-under-par 64 in the first round of the U.S. Senior Open at the Broadmoor Golf Club in Colorado Springs. He went on to finish ninth in the event. Klein won the Nebraska Open in 1993. He lettered for the Huskers in 1979 and 1980.

Steve Gotsche (Manhattan, Kansas)

A talented player and coach, Steve Gotsche competed for three seasons on the PGA Tour in 1994, 1995 and 2000. He earned his first tour card through qualifying school, and went on to produce the best PGA Tour finish of his career when he took fifth at the New England Classic in 1994. He returned to the PGA Tour in 1995 after advancing through qualifying school again, then joined the Nationwide Tour in 1996. In 1999, Gotsche won the Nike Monterrey Open and the Nike Upstate Classic on his way to a 15th-place finish on the Nationwide Tour money list to earn a place back on the PGA Tour in 2000. He returned to the Nationwide Tour in 2001 and 2002, and registered more than \$500,000 in career earnings as a professional before turning his attention to teaching. He is currently the Head PGA Professional at Colbert Hills in Manhattan, Kan. He was also the head men's golf coach at Barton County Community College for nine seasons. He began his collegiate career

at Barton County before earning letters as a Husker in 1981, 1982 and 1983.

Tom Sieckmann (Omaha, Nebraska)

A 13-year veteran on the PGA Tour, Tom Sieckmann has been an icon of the Nebraska golf community for nearly 50 years. Sieckmann made his first appearance on the PGA Tour in 1982, then made a 10-year run on the tour from 1985 to 1994, which included a top-10 finish at the 1990 U.S. Open. He recorded a PGA Tour win at the Anheuser-Busch Classic. He reappeared on tour in 1997 and 1999, closing his PGA Tour career with more than \$1.3 million in earnings, which still ranks among the top 500 golfers all-time. He returned to Omaha as the Director of Golf Instruction at the Omaha Country Club. He was also the Director of Instruction for Dave Peltz Golf (1999-2009). The 1974 Nebraska Amateur of the Year in the same season that he earned a letter for the Huskers, Sieckmann transferred to Oklahoma State and began pursuing his

professional career in 1977. Born in York, Neb., Sieckmann was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 2005. His daughter, Lauren, was a setter for the Nebraska volleyball team in 2012. In 2015, Sieckmann purchased the Palmbrook Country Club in Sun City, Ariz.

Mike Schuchart (Lincoln, Nebraska)

Following in the footsteps of Tom Sieckmann and Mark Maness, Mike Schuchart became the third Husker golfer to earn a spot on the PGA Tour. Schuchart, who was the Nebraska Class A Individual State Champion at Lincoln East High School in 1979, earned a place on the PGA Tour for the first time in 1990. He was back on the PGA Tour in 1993, before turning his attention to teaching. An eight-time Nebraska PGA Section Player of the Year (1992, 2002-08), Schuchart has been a PGA Class A Professional for 30 years. He was named the Nebraska PGA Teacher of the Year in 2003, 2004, 2010 and 2019 and was named the Nebraska PGA Professional of the Year in 2016. He is the Head Professional/Director of Instruction at Wilderness Ridge Golf Club in Lincoln and the current vice president of the PGA Nebraska Section. He was also an assistant coach for the Nebraska women's golf team from 2002 to 2018. Schuchart was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 2010. He was a four-time letterwinner at Nebraska (1981, 1982, 1983, 1985).

Mark Maness (Carrollton, Texas)

A member of the PGA Tour in 1988, Mark Maness was the second Husker to earn a spot on the professional tour. Following his stint on the PGA Tour, Maness became an outstanding instructor

and is currently a PGA Professional at the Golden Bear Golf Center in Carrollton, Texas. In 2004, he was named the Northern Texas PGA Teacher of the Year. He has served as the Director of Instruction at The Golf Center at the Highlands for more than 28 years (1995-2023). He also spent seven years with the Nicklaus/Flick Golf Schools (1996-2002) and eight years training instructors for Nicklaus Academies. He was the Head Golf Professional at Stonebridge Ranch Country Club in McKinney, Texas (1993-95). Maness was a four-year letterman at Nebraska (1980-83).

Ty Capps (Highlands Ranch, Colorado)

A talented golfer out of Colorado High School powerhouse Thunder Ridge, Ty Capps was active on PGA Tour Latinoamérica, the Nationwide Tour, the Adams Tour, the Florida Professional Golf Tour and the Sunshine Tour. He captured a PGA Tour Latinoamerica victory at the Roberto De Vincenzo Invitational Copa NEC in 2014. Capps spent two seasons at South Mountain Community College in Phoenix, Ariz., before lettering for the Huskers in 2006 and 2007. He is currently a realtor in Flagler Beach, Fla.

Brandon Crick (McCook, Nebraska)

Brandon Crick has been active on several professional tours since completing his final season at Nebraska in 2010. Crick, who was among the top 40 on the Korn Ferry Tour money list in 2024 (July 15), collected three top-20 finishes on the Korn Ferry Tour in 2022 and was ranked among the top 80 players in 2023. He finished in the top 50 on the Korn Ferry Tour in 2019. He produced six top-25 tournament finishes from August of 2020 to August of 2021.

He previously participated on the Web.Com Tour, The Dakotas Tour, the eGolf Tour, the Adams Tour, Dreamchasers Tour and the Gateway Tour. He joined the Web.com Tour in 2016. Crick was a member of two Class B state championship teams at McCook High School, producing a trio of top-three individual finishes. He competed at Gonzaga in 2007 and 2008, earning West Coast Conference Freshman-of-the-Year honors in 2007. He transferred to Nebraska and earned letters for the Huskers in 2009 and 2010. He was the Nebraska Amateur of the Year in 2009 and earned an NCAA Regional bid in 2010. He earned his bachelor's degree from Nebraska in 2015.

Steve Friesen (Lincoln, Nebraska)

One of the most accomplished all-around golfers in Nebraska history, Steve Friesen captured six professional wins on the Web.com Tour, the Nationwide Tour and the Canadian Tour in nearly two decades as a competitive professional golfer. He joined the Web.com Tour in 2007 and won the Price Cutter Charity Championship Presented by Dr. Pepper in 2011. On the Nationwide Tour he notched victories in the 2005 Nevada Open, the 2005 New Mexico Open, the 2003 Utah Open, the 2003 Waterloo Open and the 2001 Baton Rouge Open. Friesen turned pro in 1999 after being named the Ben Hogan Award winner as the nation's top scholar-athlete in men's golf. An honorable-mention All-American, he joined Scott Gutschewski in leading the Huskers to the best season in school history with a 14th-place finish at the NCAA Championships. Friesen, who earned his bachelor's degree as a biological sciences major from Nebraska in 2000, is currently the Director of Instruction at Firethorn Golf Club in Lincoln. In 2018, he was named the Nebraska PGA Section Assistant Professional Player of the Year. A four-year letterman for the Huskers (1996-99), Friesen was an inaugural inductee into the Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2015.



Brandon Crick has been a fixture on the Korn Ferry Tour the past four seasons (2019-23), including a trip to the Korn Ferry Tour Finals in 2019.

Kevin Gillick (Lincoln, Nebraska)

A two-year letterman at Nebraska in 2012 and 2013, Kevin Gillick played on The Dakotas Tour and the Adams Tour before competing on the Canadian Tour in 2018. Gillick was a three-time all-state golfer at Lincoln Pius X, while also helping Notre Dame Prep (Scottsdale, Ariz.) to a state title as a sophomore in 2007. He earned his bachelor's degree in finance from Nebraska in 2013. He spent two seasons at the University of Denver (2010, 2011) before transferring to Nebraska to close his collegiate career.

Justin Jennings (Amarillo, Texas)

Justin Jennings tied for 23rd at the PGA Tour Latinoamerica Qualifying Tournament in Argentina in February of 2018. He made his first appearance on PGA Tour Latinoamerica at the Puerto Plata DR Open in May of 2018. He earned his bachelor's degree from Nebraska in marketing in 2017, and his master's degree in finance from SMU. He is a vice president for commercial lending at Origin Bank in Dallas. He was a four-time Husker letterwinner (2014-17).

Ryan Lenahan (Grosse Pointe, Michigan)

A four-year letterman for the Huskers (2003, 2005-07), Ryan Lenahan enjoyed successful seasons on The Dakotas Tour before embarking on the European Challenge Tour in 2015. He won the biggest pursed event on the Dakotas Tour in 2011 at the Arrowhead Pro-Am, before winning the 2012 North Dakota Open. He won four Dakotas Tour events overall, while capturing 25 event titles across various pro tours in his career. He also played in the 2014 John Deere Classic and was the first alternate for the 2013 U.S. Open at Merion. He is currently an instructor at the Kendall Academy at Miles of

Golf in Ann Arbor, Mich. He makes his home in New Hudson, Mich., with his wife, Amy, and sons Mason and Parker.

Scott Allacher (Gretna, Nebraska)

A Husker letterman in 1984 and 1986, Scott Allacher was a long-time pro at the Platteview Country Club (1996-2008) before being named the Director of Golf at Tiburon Golf Club in Omaha (2009-10). Allacher was the Nebraska PGA President (2003-05).

Bryan Bennett (Valparaiso, Indiana)

A Husker letterman in 1992, Bryan Bennett was a PGA assistant professional from 1994 to 2001. He was also an assistant men's golf coach at Valparaiso in 2009.

Charlie Borner Jr. (Lincoln, Nebraska)

The Director of Golf at Hillcrest Country Club in Lincoln for 35 years, Charlie Borner was the Nebraska PGA Professional of the Year in 1986 and won the PGA Section Championship in 1988. He competed in eight PGA National Club Professional Championships. He has served on the Board of Directors for the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame, after being inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2000. A letterwinner for the Huskers in 1966, 1967 and 1968, Borner was the first Husker to ever earn an individual spot at the NCAA Championships in 1967. Borner was the first player in history to sweep the Nebraska Amateur and the Nebraska Match Play championships in the same year (1970) at the Country Club of Lincoln. A three-time Nebraska Amateur champion (1968, 1970, 1973) he was the Nebraska Amateur of the Year in 1973. He was a two-time Class A State High School Champion at Lincoln High in 1963 and 1964. He spent six years as a teacher and golf coach

at North Platte before returning to Lincoln as an assistant pro at Omaha's Highlands Country Club. He also served as an assistant professional at The Country Club of Lincoln for eight years, being named the head professional at Hillcrest Country Club in Lincoln in 1983. He was named the Director of Golf at Hillcrest in 1990.

Steven C. Bruening (Thornton, Colorado)

Steve Bruening is a PGA Professional and the General Manager of the Riverdale Golf Club in Brighton, Colo. He is a member of the Southwest Greens management team of golf courses in the Denver area. Originally from Superior, Neb., Bruening was a two-time letterwinner as a Husker (1982, 1984).

Scott Brunzell (Grand Island, Nebraska)

A long-time PGA Professional, Scott Brunzell was the PGA Professional at Jackrabbit Run Golf Course in Grand Island, Neb., for 30 years from 1977 to 2006. In 1983, he was the Nebraska Section Professional of the Year. Prior to his work at Jackrabbit Run, Brunzell was a teaching pro at Happy Hollow Golf Club in Omaha (1972-75) and was the 1975 Nebraska Section Assistant Professional of the Year. Brunzell was a three-year letterman at Nebraska (1969, 1971, 1972).

Vic Carder (Elkhorn, Nebraska)

A world-renowned teacher and 41-year PGA Professional, Vic Carder retired after spending more than a decade as the Director of Golf at the Foshan Golf Club, Dahanu Resort in the Henggang Nanhai District of Foshan City, China (2013-24). Prior to his work in Foshan City, Carder was the Director of Golf at the Lion Lake Country Club (2011-13) and the Head Golf Professional at Mate Golf (2010-11). After starting as an 11-year-old caddie at the Country Club of Lincoln,



A three-time Nebraska letterman, Bryan Hughett is a five-time winner of the Nebraska Senior PGA Professional Championship (2014, 2016, 2017, 2019, 2023). Hughett was a PGA Professional at the Norfolk Country Club (2002-18), before serving as the PGA Professional at Albion Country Club (2018-23). Originally from Lincoln, Hughett was the 1982 Nebraska Class A High School State Champion at Lincoln East while leading the Spartans to the state team title.

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Carder lettered as a Husker golfer in 1977 and 1979. He was an assistant PGA professional at the Houston Country Club, before becoming the head professional at Brookside Golf & Country Club. He was also the head professional at Countryside Golf & Country Club in Naples, Fla.

Judd Cornell (Omaha, Nebraska)

The head coach at Nebraska beginning in 2022, Judd Cornell was a four-time letterwinner at Nebraska (2003-06), before serving as assistant coach (2013-17) and associate head coach (2017-19) for the Huskers. He served as the head coach at Creighton (2019-22) while also serving as the Director of Instruction at The Players Club in Omaha. He was the 2004 Nebraska Amateur of the Year and a three-time team captain as a Husker, helping Nebraska to a 2006 NCAA Regional berth.

Jay Cottam (Hebron, Nebraska)

The assistant professional at Meadowlark Hills Golf Club in Kearney since 2022, Jay Cottam previously served as an assistant pro at Awarii Dunes in Axtell, Neb. He is in his sixth season as the director of player development for the Nebraska-Kearney women's golf team. The 2022 Nebraska PGA Assistant Player of the Year, Cottam played at both UNK and Nebraska, tying for 16th at the 2019 Big Ten Championship and finishing with a 73.42 stroke average. In the summer of 2020, the Hebron, Neb., native won the PGA Nebraska Section Assistant Match Play Championship. He also won the Nebraska PGA Cup Series Championship in 2020. Cottam was a two-time All-MIAA selection for the Lopers and the 2015 Nebraska Class C state champion at Thayer Central. In 2017, he was the NGA Amateur Match Play champion.

John J. Dinnebier (Ankeny, Iowa)

With 30 years of experience as a golf professional, John Dinnebier became the General Manager at Briarwood Golf Club in Ankeny, Iowa in 2018. Dinnebier had spent the previous 17 years as the General Manager at Lake Panorama National Golf Club in Panora, Iowa (2002-18). A four-year letterman at Nebraska (1986-89), Dinnebier was an assistant pro at the Des Moines Golf and Country Club (1993-97) and at Red Carpet Golf Club in Waterloo, Iowa (1990-93).

David Donachie (Amarillo, Texas)

With well over 30 years of experience as a PGA Professional, former Husker David Donachie has been the General Manager of Tascosa and La Paloma Golf Clubs in Amarillo, Texas since 2003. Donachie was previously the Director of Golf at Champions Run in Omaha, Nebraska (1993-2001) and the Director of Golf at Picacho Hills Country Club in Las Cruces, N.M. (1986-93). Donachie was a 1976 golf letterman at Nebraska.

Eric H. Eshleman (Birmingham, Alabama)

One of the nation's most acclaimed instructors, Eric Eshleman is the Director of Golf at the Country Club of Birmingham in Alabama. Eshleman was named the 2019 PGA Person of the Year by the PGA of America, which is the highest honor given by the PGA. In 2017, Eshleman was the Alabama/Northwest Florida Section PGA Professional of the Year. Among his

more recognizable pupils are Graem McDowell, Paul Dunne from the European Tour and former U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice. Eshleman was a two-time letterman at Nebraska in 1989 and 1990. Eric and his wife, Kelli, are Nebraska graduates and have three sons.

Kenny Hughes (Gautier, Mississippi)

With more than 30 years of experience as a PGA Professional, Kenny Hughes is not only a Class A professional but also the CEO and General Manager of Shell Landing Golf Club on the Mississippi Gulf Coast. His ownership group also owns Mississippi National/Hickory Hill Country Club. Hughes previously served as a Head Golf Pro at the Broadwater Sun Course in Biloxi, Miss., which became President Broadwater Golf Club in 2007, when he was promoted to Director of Golf. He was also an assistant professional at Hickory Hill Country Club (1986-90). Prior to earning a golf letter at Nebraska as a junior in 1982, Hughes attended Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College. He played his senior season at Southern Miss before earning his degree. He was the PGA Apprentice Player of the Year in Mississippi (1989).

Bryan R. Hughett (Albion, Nebraska)

A 27-year PGA Professional, Bryan Hughett retired after a successful career at the Albion Country Club (2018-23) and Norfolk Country Club (2002-18). A five-time Nebraska Senior PGA Pro Champion, Hughett claimed his fifth title in 2023, after also winning the tournament in 2014, 2016, 2017 and 2019. Originally from Lincoln, Hughett was the 1982 Nebraska Class A Individual State Champion at Lincoln East High School to lead the Spartans to a team title. He

lettered for the Huskers as a golfer in 1983, 1984 and 1985.

Bradford Lindahl (Omaha, Nebraska)

A 20-year PGA Professional in the Omaha area, Bradford Lindahl passed away on Feb. 2, 2008, after a battle with cancer at the age of 43. Lindahl lettered at Nebraska in 1998.

Steve Mack (Huntsville, Alabama)

The Vice President of Golf Operations and Director of Golf at SunBelt Golf Corporation, Steve Mack is a PGA Professional at The Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail @ Hampton Cove River, Short and Highlands courses. The Nebraska Class A State Champion at Grand Island High School in 1977, Mack lettered in golf at Nebraska in 1981 and 1982.

Josh Madden (Perth, Australia)

A four-year letterwinner at Nebraska, Josh Madden returned to Australia as one of the country's top PGA Professionals. In November 2023, he was named the General Manager at Killara Golf Club near Sydney, after spending four years as the GM of Wembley Golf Course in Perth (2018-22). He opened Australia's second PGA Centre for Learning and Performance in 2019. He was named the 2020 PGA National Management Professional of the Year. He spent two years at the Toowoomba Golf Club. He was a PGA Professional in Western and South Australia (2014-16). He served as the Marketing & Student Recruitment Manager for the PGA of Australia from 2009 to 2014. He was an apprentice professional at Surfers Paradise Golf Club in Gold Coast, Australia (2004-07) before becoming a full-time professional in 2008. Madden was a first-team All-Big 12 selection in 1997 and helped Nebraska to its most successful seasons in school history from 1996 to 1999.

Derek Nannen (Fountain Hills, Arizona)

A PGA Professional for more than 15 years at the Eagle Mountain Golf Club and Eagle Mountain Golf Academy, Derek Nannen is establishing himself as a successful teacher of the game. Nannen was the 1990 Nebraska Class C State Champion at Geneva High School, before earning a letter at Nebraska in 1993. He went on to earn GCAA All-America Scholar honors at Grand Canyon in 1996. As a 16-year-old at the Nebraska Junior Amateur Championship in 1989, Nannen recorded two holes in one in the same round at York Country Club.

Tyler Parsloe (Lone Tree, Colorado)

One of the most recent PGA Professionals the Nebraska golf program has produced, Tyler Parsloe serves as a professional at Jake's Academy in Lone Tree, Colo., where he is the Director of Nike Junior Golf Camps. He won the 2020 Colorado PGA Pro-Assistant Championship. He has been a member of the PGA Colorado Section since 2012. Parsloe led ThunderRidge High School in Littleton to four consecutive Colorado Class 6A state championships and was the Colorado Junior Player of the Year in both 2005 and 2006. He lettered at Nebraska in 2008, 2009 and 2010.

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Late Nebraska men's golf coach Larry Romjue led the Huskers to their most successful season in school history with a 14th-place finish at the 1999 NCAA Championships. Romjue, who was a letterman at Nebraska (1958-60), coached the Huskers from 1969-70 to 2000-01 and was named the Nebraska PGA Professional of the Year in 1984. He is pictured with Steve Friesen, the current Director of Instruction at Firethorn Golf Club in Lincoln and the winner of the 1999 Ben Hogan Award.

Tony Pesavento (Omaha, Nebraska)

A PGA Professional in Nebraska for more than 30 years, Tony Pesavento twice served as the Nebraska PGA President (1989-91; 2015-17). The Head Professional at the Omaha Country Club since 1993, Pesavento was the Nebraska PGA Professional of the Year in both 1991 and 2015. He also worked at Skyline Woods Country Club, Platteview Golf Club, and the Field Club of Omaha. He was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 2024. Pesavento lettered at Nebraska in 1976 before graduating from Creighton in 1979.

Seth Porter (Omaha, Nebraska)

Seth Porter is in his second year as the Director of Instruction at The Club at Indian Creek in Elkhorn, after previously serving as the head men's (2014-23) and women's (2016-23) golf coach at Omaha. He was an assistant professional at the Granite Falls Golf Club in Surprise and the Union Hills Country Club in Sun City, Ariz., before returning to Nebraska as the assistant men's golf coach at UNO. He was a four-year letterman at Nebraska (1999, 2000, 2001, 2003). He advanced to the round of the 16 at the 2001 U.S. Amateur, after being named the Nebraska Junior Amateur of the Year in both 1995 and 1996.

Jeff Rafferty (Cheyenne, Wyoming)

With nearly 30 years as a PGA Professional, Rafferty is in his third year as the Head Professional at the Cheyenne Golf Club. He spent nine years

at the Buffalo Golf Club. Rafferty served as the Head PGA Professional at The Powder Horn in Sheridan, Wyo., (2012-13), after working as the head pro at the Casper Country Club (2003-09). A 1987 graduate of Buffalo High School, Rafferty returned to Wyoming after serving as the head professional at Elks Country Club in Columbus, Neb. (2001-02). He has been a PGA member since 1996. Rafferty, who lettered at Nebraska in 1989, 1991 and 1992, is married to Nebraska women's golf letterwinner Melissa Busskohl, who is originally from Norfolk.

Steven G. Reiter (Brandon Valley, South Dakota)

A four-year letterman at Nebraska (1992-95), Steve Reiter helps run the Hidden Valley Golf Course in Brandon Valley, S.D., which has been owned by the Reiter family for more than 50 years. It was his home course when he won the South Dakota state high school title in 1989.

Rick Reynolds (Blue Springs, Missouri)

A PGA Class A Professional for more than 35 years, Rick Reynolds currently serves as a club pro at Stone Canyon Golf Club in Blue Springs, Mo. He previously served as the Head Golf Pro at Lakewood Oaks Golf Club (1982-2007) after working as an assistant pro at the same club (1979-81). Reynolds was a three-time letterwinner at Nebraska from 1977 to 1979.

Larry Romjue (Lincoln, Nebraska)

The head men's golf coach at the University of Nebraska for more than 30 years (1969-70 to 2000-01), Larry Romjue was an active member of the Lincoln and Nebraska golf communities before his death in 2019. The Nebraska PGA Professional of the Year in 1984 and the Nebraska PGA Section Player of the Year in 1980, Romjue was the Vice President of the Nebraska Golf Association in 2016. He was posthumously inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 2021. He was a three-time letterman at Nebraska (1958-60).

Robert G. Saffer (Lincoln, Nebraska)

A long-time PGA Professional at Crooked Creek Golf Club, Robert Saffer became a PGA Pro in 1997. He was named the Nebraska PGA Section Teaching Professional of the Year in 2009. He was a Nebraska Class A High School champion at Omaha Westside in 1959, while playing for his father. Saffer earned a scholarship to Arizona out of high school, before transferring to Nebraska and lettering as a Husker in 1964 and 1965.

Rick Schultz (Independence, Missouri)

A PGA Member for nearly 50 years, Rick Schultz is the head PGA Professional at The Golf Club at Creekmoor in Independence, Mo. He is also the Tournament and Event Coordinator for the Midwest PGA. Schultz oversees the HOPE program, PGA Junior Championship and the PGA Junior League Championship. He was

named the PGA Midwest Section Patriot Award winner in 2019. He is a 1973 Husker alum and qualified for the NCAA Championship twice as an individual and was a part of the first Nebraska team to qualify for Nationals. Schultz is one of three Husker golfers to win a gold or silver medal at the U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship.

James Sieckmann (Omaha, Nebraska)

A legendary golf teacher and PGA Professional, James Sieckmann was selected as the PGA National Teacher of the Year in 2018. In nearly 30 years as a PGA member, Sieckmann has been named the Nebraska PGA Teacher of the Year 10 times (1996, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2006, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016). He has served as the PGA Director of Golf at the Academy at Shadow Ridge Country Club in Omaha since 1994, and has been named one of Golf Magazine's Top 100 Teachers in America and a Top 30 Instructor by Golf Digest. He is a Titleist Performance Institute Advisory Board Member and was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 2016. He was a four-year letterman at Nebraska (1985-88).

Ron Thayer (Superior, Nebraska)

The manager of the Superior Country Club, Ron Thayer earned a letter for the Huskers in 1987. He is also the head coach of the Superior High School boys golf team.

Jim Troy (Mount Vernon, Ohio)

A four-time Northern Ohio PGA Section Player of the Year (2018, 2020, 2021, 2022), Jim Troy is one of the most recent Huskers to earn PGA Professional status. He spent nearly three years as the First Assistant Professional at the Mount Vernon Country Club in Ohio. In 2023, he joined the instruction staff at The Golf Dome in Chagrin Falls, Ohio, where he leads the Junior Golf Academy. He was previously a Golf Instructor/Coach at the Golf Performance Academy of Southwest Michigan (2015-18) and an Assistant Golf Professional at the Sunset Ridge Country

Club in Northfield, Ill. (2014). He was also the First Assistant Golf Professional at the Elyria Country Club, when he was named the 2013 Northern Ohio PGA Section Apprentice Player of the Year. He competed on the NGA Tour and the Fore the Players Tour (2007-13) and was named the Fore the Players Tour Player of the Year in 2013. A four-year letterman at Nebraska (2000-03), he earned his bachelor's degree from NU in 2004.

Mike Troy (Woodridge, Illinois)

In his 26th year as a Class A PGA Professional, Mike Troy has been teaching at Zigfield Troy Golf in Woodbridge, Ill., since 1998. Troy was the Illinois PGA Assistant Player of the Year in both 2000 and 2001, and he competed in the U.S. Open in 2000. In September of 2020, Troy won the Illinois PGA Senior Match Play Championship. He lettered at Nebraska in 1989 and 1990.

Ralph Alan (Bud) Williamson (Kansas City, Missouri)

A legendary teacher of the game, Bud Williamson was a PGA Professional for 46 years (1965-2011) and was a long-time coach of Tom Watson. Williamson, who lettered as a Nebraska golfer in 1961 and 1962, was the Third Head Professional at Blue Hills Country Club from 1976 until his death in 2011. He served on the PGA Midwest Section Committee and Board and was the PGA Midwest Section President in 1983. He was also on the National PGA Board of Directors and was the PGA District 7 Director. He was inducted into the PGA Midwest Section Hall of Fame in 2011, the same year he was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame. Before moving to the Kansas City area, Williamson was a nine-time Nebraska PGA Championship winner (1956-60, 1962-64, 1966). He was the Nebraska Class A State Champion at Lincoln High School, while also leading his team to the state title in 1957.



A four-time Husker letterwinner (2011-14) from Aguascalientes, Mexico, Manuel Lavin earned the Dick Spangler Golf Scholarship in 2012-13. Lavin was an event associate for PGA Tour Latinoamerica (2015-19). He founded Nuevo Swing - Mexico's first on-line golf store - and Golf Asesores.

DICK SPANGLER SCHOLARSHIP

The Dick Spangler Golf Scholarship Award is presented at the end of each golf season to a sophomore or junior golfer who has made significant contributions to the men's golf program through his attitude, effort and team spirit. Quinn Yost received the award for the 2023-24 season. The recipient is selected by the Dick Spangler Scholarship Committee.

Dick Spangler earned three letters for the Nebraska golf team from 1950 to 1952, was a Nebraska Amateur champion and served on the board of the Trans-Mississippi Golf Association. Always a gentleman, his quick wit, enjoyable sense of humor and his dedication to the game of golf bring honor and credit to the University of Nebraska and the great game of life.

Dick Spangler was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 1997. He passed away on Saturday, Nov. 8, 2003, in Lincoln.
